Also at this meeting we had the pleasure of electing Lloyd Sommerlad as a life member. Our Salute to Lloyd is headlined on the front page.



The 60th AGM of Killara Bowling Club Limited was held on Saturday 15th October and





SELECTOR'S REPORT Michael Tsolakis

It is with pleasure and with a sense of great satisfaction that I provide this report on behalf of the KBC Selectors' Committee which outlines the event (52 - 51)the KBC 2011 achievements.

Pennants: Grade 6 and Grade 7

The decision by the selectors to organise club trial matches against St. Ives, East Roseville, Turramurra and Warrawee Bowling Clubs proved a valuable asset in finalising the Killara Grade 6 and Grade 7 teams.

After enjoying a run of seven consecutive wins, which resulted in a nine point lead on its nearest rival Belrose, Killara (Grade 6 - Section 1 team) appeared set to repeat their 2010 Section win and progress to the 2011 Post Sectional Draw. Unfortunately the Killara team experienced defeats in the final three matches of the competition against Pittwater (2-4), Asquith (1-5) and Belrose (1-5); teams Killara had convincingly defeated in round one.

These losses enabled Belrose to finish on a par with Killara at the top of the points table and, with a better aggregate, Belrose was then able to progress to the Post Sectional Draw.

The Grade 7 team performed well throughout the competition to finish a credible fifth in their Section.

2012 Pennant Coaching Support Program:

The selectors wish to thank Bob Hawtree (Turramurra Bowling Club), Gof Bowles, Ric Edwards, and David Hunt Singles: Warwick Druce for their time and coaching expertise during the October/ November period of the program. The feedback received from those who took part in this program has been encouraging with the majority acknowledging that the coaching tips and regular practise has heightened their skills and skill level consistency.

Mid Week Triples:

KBC entered two teams in the Grade "C" Competition. The decision by the Zone 9 Match Committee to alter the Conditions of Play (with the new Player/Grading Rule in this year's competition) has resulted in an unfair advantage to the stronger clubs by allowing three players to play out of grade. The KBC results in this competition can be attributed to the decision by the Zone 9 match committee.

Cyril South Competition:

The fundamental aim of this competition (now in its 41^{st} year) is to provide an opportunity for members to represent KBC against the ten invited clubs competing at Grade levels 3-7.

The ten (10) invited clubs competing this year were: Asquith, Balgowlah, Belrose, Gordon, Hornsby, Lindfield, St. Ives, Turramurra, Warrawee and West Pymble.

Twenty eight (28) KBC members registered an expression of interest to play and were given the opportunity to play in at least three matches.

The four (4) clubs with the highest winning margin against Killara in the 2011 competition were Belrose, Turramurra, Warrawee and West Pymble.

At the conclusion of play on the sixty second end West Pymble were leading by one (1) shot. However Belrose struck back on the sixty third and final end with a two shot result to win



The Annual Jean Webster Trophy was held at Warrawee Bowling Club, 27th September, 2011. The first District President, Jean Webster, presented this Trophy for a Competition, to enable new players to get competitive experience,

alongside established players. Each Club in the District to enter one Team, comprising two experienced players

and two new players. Originally called the District President's Trophy, following her death, it was altered to the Jean Webster Trophy.

This year, the team from Killara was *Judy McLeod, Anne Cowlishaw, Barbara Cotton* and *Alice Burton* Skip - there were some very close and exciting Matches and at lunchtime, the leaders were Belrose - 1 win and 18 points, St, Ives -1 win and 16 points, Warrawee 1 win and 15 points and Killara - 1 win and 14 points. 
