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# THE HUNT FOR THE GIANT TUBEWORM

**Rachael Rayner**, 26 year old daughter of John and Lorraine, is "living the dream" shown here aboard *EV Nautilus* off the Galapagos Islands.



Rachael is employed by the **Bendigo Discovery Science and Technology Centre.** Let her tell the story . . .

"The *giant tube worm* was first discovered in 1977 by Dr Robert Ballard, who is on the ship. He is the chief scientist and wanted to return to the site and see what it looked like after all these years. The giant tube worm is a creature that lives on bacteria. The bacteria create their energy through a process called 'chemosynthesis'. Before 1977, before the discovery of these giant tube worms, we all just assumed that the bottom of the food chain started with plants photosynthesising, making their energy from the sun.

But there's no sunlight down here, these bacteria take chemicals out of hot, rushing water that's been heated up by volcanic activity, taking minerals out of that and using them to create energy.

The tube worms live on the bacteria that's making that energy, and they are one of the fastest growing organisms on our planet.

My job is science communicator, I help people at home know what's going on and can figure out how things are working on the ship.

We have two ROVs on board (remotely operated vehicles), they do the exploring for us. We send them down into the deep and they can be down there for up to three days at a time.

Because they are down there for so long we have three separate watch teams that control the ROVs; we rotate throughout the day, 8 hours every day, four hours on and off.

My job is to answer questions that come online. If you go to <u>www.nautiluslive.org</u> you'll see a live feed there. When we're diving you can ask us questions, very likely me!

How good is that! Have a look at the WEB site and give me a call."

#### WITH THE ONSET OF OUR CENTENARY, WE PAUSE TO REFLECT ON JUST ONE OF THE MANY THAT BUILT AND SUSTAINED OUR CLUB.

W.G. FIRTH : LIFE MEMBER

Graham Firth was recognised with Life Membership and the naming of a green in recognition of his contribution in many roles for some 35 years. Graham celebrated his 100th birthday in our clubhouse which was 'packed out' with 150 guests!

The honour boards record his success on the green, as Singles Champion in 1974, a

triples winner and three times winner of the Fours championship. In Club administration, he was Vice-President of the Bowling Committee, Deputy Chairman of Killara Bowling Club Ltd and for many years was in charge of the House and of the Property Committee.

Throughout his life he was an influential leader in every field which has attracted his interest. He spent his working life in the family packaging business, PJ Firth Ltd, founded by his grandfather in 1893 and was its Managing Director from 1946 until it was taken over in 1969. For 15 years he was on the executive committee of the Printing and Allied Trades Association and its President from 1963-5.

A devoted churchman, he was treas-

urer, deacon, choir member and Sunday school secretary of his local church and held high office for 20 years, including President, of the Congregational Union of NSW.

He served on the executive committee of the NSW Churches



Cricket Association and himself, played in the A grade until he discovered the pleasure of bowls.

A sports lover, Graham became involved with Rugby Union, and

typically filled positions as secretary, treasurer and then President of the Drummoyne Club. He was a founding member of the Sydney Rugby Union and brought his enthusiasm and skills to running the Rugby Union Co-OperatIve.

Naturally, a man with such high ideals of service was a member of Rotary, first at Sydney Club and later at Burwood where he be-

came President. He was a Paul Harris Fellow and gave particular support to vocational and international programs and the Rotary Foundation.

During his long life, if there was a job to be done, Graham volunteered to do it. He died in 2008 aged 101.








Lawn bowls today are made from a hard plastic called *Phenolformaldehyde*, they are perfectly round one way (fig. 1) and oval shaped the other (fig. 2). The bias is produced by making the bowl lopsided (fig. 3), however it is so minute that it can't been seen with the naked eye. When the bowl is delivered along its running surface, there is sufficient momentum to keep it running straight along its course. As the bowl slows down it attempts to find its true centre of balance, forcing it to curve. The running surface of the bowl is the part of the bowl which is in contact with the green when in motion.

#### Exaggerated View of a Lawn Bowl



Lawn bowl sizes range from size 00 through to size 7. Only 1 to 2 mm in diameter separates the sizes of bowls, the differences are small but considerable when gripping various sized bowls.

Every bowl has an emblem engraved on each side. One side has a small emblem with the bowl's size, weight, serial number & the manufacturer's stamp around it. The other side has the same emblem, but larger. The small side is the bias side. This means it is the side that it will turn towards when in motion.

The shape of the bowl varies among brands and models. The visible differences are small, but play a large role in the behavior of the bowl.

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# Harry Escombe Ravenhill Jerram 1925—2015

# Extracted from a feature written by George Wall (deceased) which appeared in KBN#7 December 2004.

Harry Jerram was born on 20th August 1925 in Hale, a small village in Cheshire, his only brother Nigel was born 5 years later. In 1930 Harry's Father was appointed Chief Locomotive Inspector of All Indian Railways, one of the largest and best rail systems in the world at that time. However, the international economy was sliding into the Great Depression causing the family to be divided. Harry remained in England at boarding school. Consequently he saw little of his father over the next seven years . Harry attended Malvern College, one of the England's old and famous Public Schools. Life proceeded in a normal fashion until the start of WW 2 when the school buildings were suddenly commandeered and the boys were sent to the Duke of Malborough's Blenheim Palace at Woodstock! Imagine 400 school boys descending on one of the stately homes of England! A real worry, but Harry assured me they did little damage that could not be repaired . After a year they were to return to Malvern but the Government again wanted the school for the development of Radar so the boys were sent, this time, to Harrow School in Middlesex.

In November 1943 Harry left school to join the RAF and was sent to an EFTS at Picton in Canada where he gained his wings. However, the great air battles over Europe were coming to an end and the demand for replacement aircrew was growing less so on his return to England, Harry was sent to Lerwick, Shetland Islands where there was an RAF weather station collecting valuable information for metrology units all over the UK. Lerwick was a bleak, inhospitable and isolated place but the work was interesting and rewarding.

At the end of the war Harry was faced with the need of finding work and managed to obtain a position with the P &O shipping line as a Pursers Clerk on the "Strath " class liners that carried passengers between London and Australian ports. Overseas travel, once only for the wealthy, was becoming more affordable and



this attracted both the young and the more mature to set out on this great adventure .

Work in the Pursers Department was constant and varied. In addition to looking after the passengers they did much of the victualling of the ship, keeping accounts, paying 500 odd crew members and keeping port officials onside .

On these voyages, to and from Australia and London, the young passengers seized the opportunity to enjoy every moment and the crew were equally willing to join in and as Harry said "they worked hard and played hard, which was a wonderful life for a young single bloke" This lasted some five years without too much damage to Harry's health until on one memorable voyage Harry was assigned the duty of ensuring that a *Mrs. Vicars* - the wife of a prominent Sydney industrialist traveling with her two daughters - had a pleasant and enjoyable voyage. This he did however, with the famous aria from the opera *Don Giovanni* ringing in his head ... "*My days of philandering are over*" ... realizing that his life was about to make a dramatic change as one of Mrs Vicar's daughters, *Anne*, had made a made a very deep impression.

Now he had to make some far reaching decisions. To resign his position with the shipping company meant a return to the UK and then another voyage to Australia and return to complete his contract and leave the Company in the UK and get back to Australia as best he could. All this he did, arriving in a strange country without a job and the need to make a new life for himself and his future wife.

Harry had given up the sea and thrown in his lot with the colonials. This meant he had followed his heart so Anne and he were married on 20<sup>th</sup> February 1954 at *St.Marks* Church, Darling Point. Their marriage was blessed with four fine children, three daughters and a son all of whom are now happily married.

Harry joined *Switzerland and General Insurance Company Ltd* and a 30 year career in Underwriting and Insurance Broking. He was active in local community activities including Scouts, Rostrum, Rotary and Probus.

He was dedicated to our club and served as Secretary to the Board

, and other committee duties over many years. In his final years he suffered with leg problems which progressively restricted his mobility. He still loved his bowls and social contact at the club. He never complained and was grateful for any assistance. A delightful man. All who knew him enjoyed his company.
