Grants Committee aces *Don Reade* and *lan Calder* have received advice from the Department of Sport and Recreation that our application for a grant to enable provision a disabled toilet facility has been successful. The concept plan proposed in March 2015 (see Page 2) will now go ahead.

Jonathan O'Dea's advocacy has resulted in three (3) grants; In addition to this one we have received assistance for the construction of the new stairs to no. 1 green and replacement of sunshades. We are most grateful for the government's continued support in helping to enhance our facilities and ensuring we remain a financially viable community centre.



JOHN SCOTT BAKER 1929 — 2016 Member 22 years




Acquaintances of *John Baker* knew him as a great Clubman, Committee man and tireless contributor during his 22 years as a member.

There are hundreds of Bakers in the Sydney Directory but very few have the provenance of John's family in the his-

tory of life on Sydney's Upper North Shore. John's grandfather, William John Baker migrated to Australia in 1885 and joined a cutlery concern. He went to business on his own in 1888 establishing his retail shop at 597 George St. Sydney. The business thrived



so that in 1891 the **W. Jno Baker House of Steel** opened at 3 Hunter street.



The major part of their business was the supply of equipment to the rural industries including shears, electric fencing, branding and weighing gear. John was in the family business and traveled extensively to rural shows displaying and promoting the companies wares. In his early years, John had a very good record as an athlete representing his School, Barker College as a top sprinter, he was also in the 1st XV and the 2nd XI for cricket. He was a member of Roseville Golf Club. Farewell John. You are missed. Commiserations to Margaret.

HAROLD JOHN (JACK) WILLIAMS 1930 — 2016 Member 16 years

Harold John Williams, always known as 'Jack' was born on 26 April 1930. He lived in the family home in

West Footscray, Melbourne until age 25 when he married local girl Margaret Campbell aged 23 who was working as a telephonist. Margaret the youngest of four girls had been taken out of school to look after her infirm mother and household responsibilities had weighed heavily on her during her teenage years. During their courtship Jack and Margaret were regulars at the weekly dances.

They built a new home in Essendon and their first child Deanne was born in 1958. Jack worked at Spartan Paints as an Industrial Chemist, formulating automotive paints. (He was responsible for those 'pink' cement trucks). The family was transferred to Sydney by Spartan and rented a house at Kangaroo Point on the Georges River with its own oyster lease. (Unfortunately they hadn't acquired a taste for oysters then.) A son, Simon was born in 1962. Jack travelled to work at Botany and Margaret often took the children to the beach.

They bought land in a new subdivision in St Ives and settled there for many years. The family spent many weekends fishing, canoeing, and having picnics with friends. Jack continued to work at Botany as Spartan became Wattle Paints and part of the James Hardie Group. Jack also enjoyed tinkering with electronics,

a passion which had started when he built his first crystal set as a boy.

Margaret and Jack moved to Killara in 1997. Margaret took up golf playing 2 and 3 days a week and Jack took up bowling. As golf became a bit too strenuous Margaret also joined Jack in bowling. Sadly as Margaret's dementia progressed and Jack had shoulder and mobility issues they had to say goodbye to their bowling days at Killara Bowling Club.

KBC GOES SOLAR

No doubt members have noticed the recent appearance of **solar panels** on the roof of our club house.

These were paid for out of the club's own funds at a cost of around \$12,000; No grant this time!


The upfront cost of \$12,000 is the discounted cost after the rebate

offered by the New South Wales Government – which was taken up by the solar panel supplier.

Whilst the discounted cost is still relatively high for a club such as ours, it will nevertheless be recovered in reduced power costs is around 4 years. In the medium term therefore the cost of the panels will be **zero**.

The project team members, basically **Don Reade**, **Geoff Leppinus** and **John Brodie** were very anxious that the installation of the panels would not detract from the appearance of our new roof and the club house generally. They are now comfortable that the panels do blend in nicely and hope members are happy with the result

The club's next project along these lines might be to look at the pros and cons of installing a solar battery storage unit to store excess electricity generated by the panels instead of selling it back to the "Grid" at the present low sale price. We are hoping that this initiative might eliminate our power bill (around \$7,000 pa) completely in future. We understand solar battery storage units cost around \$10,000 - but if we are lucky we might get a grant!!





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

Some of the more significant items of expenditure from the fund are:-

New Blinds, Sun Shades, Paints and materials, additional carpark lighting, New Overhead fans, Repair carpets, Video equipment, Centenary functions, Carpark drainage, repair benches. The account has a balance of \$23,000
