

Killara and Lindfield joined forces to were excited to have represented North Shore District at the State Play Off at Bateau Bay in August.


Although we could not win the State title, we all enjoyed this wonderful experience. We will try again in 2018.

When Killara Bowling Club was first incorporated in 1919, its Articles provided that the purpose of the Club was to promote

Bowls, skittles and other recreations and pastimes. When Walter Maling joined the Club in July 1944 the Hon.Secretary wrote in his welcoming letter, 'hoping you will enjoy a pleasant game of Bowls, Cards, Dominoes and Draughts with us'.

Walter paid his Five Guinea subscription and added that it was a pity the Club did not have a little spare space to accommodate a pitch for Petanque, a game similar to bowls and very popular in France. He continued his letter by saying, 'it can be



played on any patch of hard, reasonable level ground about 20 metres long. The bowls or 'boules' are of solid metal, about the size of a cricket ball and are tossed in the air with the object of rolling them to a stop close to kitty. Walter finished with the words that he had noticed this being played at on Club he visited during the Pennant Season.

In October 1989 he celebrated his 87th birthday in his 45th year of membership, having won the Minor Singles, 1947-48, was runner up to the Club Championship in

1951-52, skipped No 1 Pennant Team for Killara and an active Committee Member and Selector for many years between 1950's and early 1960's. Despite his suggestion on first becoming a member, Petanque never became a game at the Club. I wonder how many new members feel motivated to suggest a new game to a club they have only just joined. No harm in trying I suppose.

The Delivery


Most of the frustration associated with poor bowling comes from errors in your delivery sequence.

What you do on the mat, and your 'grassing' of the bowl, determines what happens at the other end. You must be entirely in the "present" when you are on the mat, concentrating solely on your delivery. Visualize it but do not be in the "future" and anticipate the result of your delivery at the other end.



This picture is the delivery of Bob Purcell who started bowls at the Gordon Club, represented Australia in the Commonwealth Games and a former Chairman of the RQBA. Does your delivery display "the Art of Bowling" to this degree?

Work on it for your satisfaction and greater enjoyment of the game. The bowl is grassed ten cm in front of the front foot, along your grassline with your elbow and wrist locked straight. Ninety percent of your weight should be on




the front foot and the back knee bent so that you do not *DUMP* the bowl or bounce it out along the grassline.

It is important that you stay down and follow through with straight arm, palm upright over your aiming point with eyes on the bowl until it has traveled seven metres up the green. Then bring your back foot

up to the front foot and stand steady in front of the

mat and watch your bowl travel up the green. As your bowl slows move directly back from the mat so that you are two metres behind the mat when your bowl comes to rest. (Law 37) If you move up off the mat or to the left or right, or even raise your eyes to look at the jack, then your bowl will invariably cross the head.



















PHIL JOHNSON IS RECOGNISED WITH A 30 YEAR AWARD.

A glimpse of a success story forged from a happy marriage and intelligent hard work . . .

Phil's career commenced in November 1953, when at the age of 18, he joined a Chartered Accountancy which controlled a small Real Estate Agency Rent Roll. Phil, as well as accountancy duties, was required, each Monday, to conduct a rent run



covering streets in Balmain East. He was given a leather briefcase and collected the rents in cash .. individually about 2 to 3 pounds a week those days . . and ended his run carrying up to 150 pounds; no doubt a hazardous undertaking!

It was here that Phil decided that Real Estate offered a career opportunity and focused on getting his license. His first sale was a weatherboard in Beattie Street Rozelle, which sold for 100 pounds. (compare that with the briefcase!) When the owner of the Chartered Accountancy died, Phil took up a position in a Gladesville Agency looking after Rentals & sales. His first sale was a block of 4 rent controlled units, which
