

CLUB HISTORIAN Elizabeth Dokulil More glimpses from her research . . .

Bill McLean was a member in 1961 and he wrote a history of KBC. However he fell out with the

Board and refused to hand over his notes. Evidently after his death his wife gave a copy to the KBC where they languished until one day Lloyd Sommerlad (also an historian) came across them. In rifling through the many boxes placed in the high cupboard on the way to the kitchen beside the walkin refrigerator, I found a yellowing, dog-eared copy. From the notes it is obvious Bill harboured a great love for his Bowling Club and was an indefatigable researcher as the detail he wrote I found extremely interestina.

I intend using some of his notes over the next few issues of Bowls News to give you a chance to read them.

The first club house, of modest proportions, was built with a dividing wall, one part for the tennis players, facing east, and the other for bowlers facing west. Up until this time (1913), as far as can be ascertained, everything was provided by J G Edwards who charged a rental.

Incidentally, the party wall between the two club houses remained until 1953, when the Tennis Club demolished its portion of the old structure and built a fine brick two storey club house 18 inches away from the party wall, which then became the rear and external wall of part of the present Bowling Club House.

From the original 30 members in 1916, money was raised in 1919 to buy a tennis court to make No 1 Green and then in 1920 extend the clubhouse. "The fact of the matter is we did it through debentures and contributions to the extent by 1926 owned the property freehold to the tune of between 5000 and 6000 pounds!

The success of the group was remarkable. There was a small membership, no entry fee, a low subscription, practically no outside help and so much to be accomplished - extend the lower green (No 2), build the upper green (No 1) and extend the clubhouse."

It was effected by the generosity of some members by gifts, the hat going round, card parties, picture nights and concerts to pay for some much needed amenity.

Attendance was very gratifying with 64 members and friends enjoying a delicious meals catered by All Events and comment on the two course meal was very positive.




Ten prizes were offered in the raffle and diners were supportive providing a satisfactory outcome for the evening.



Liberation of the ladder.If you liked *Bowling at Columbine*, chances are you will enjoy 80% of one of the chapters

in the book in Michael Moore's **Stupid White Men** which puts forward the startling hypothesis that men are basically finished. According to Moore they were only needed to father babies and reach for things that were too high for women. Now we have IVF and ladders we don't need men anymore.

It is true that you can get into trouble today if you suggest that there are boys tasks and girls tasks and many of the traditional role tasks are now shared. There were eight women in my class at medical school and there was a feeling amongst some they shouldn't have been there, as they would get married and have babies and leave the work force. Nowadays when I look at the med school prize board there aren't many blokes; even the High Court and the Prime Minister's job are available to the girls.

I think Moore is over the top. Men will always have their uses. As a friend of mine says, "You can't teach a vibrator to cut the grass." (Actually my wife Mrs R cuts the grass.)

But there are still tasks women need to liberate in the interests of equality. The barbecue, a vestige of chauvinism leaps to mind for one. The other major one is one of Moore's. If, as he suggests, the ladder renders men superfluous, then it is time they liberated the ladder.

I have a concern about ladders. For twenty five years every two weeks I saw a patient who fell off a ladder. Only two women in that group. All the rest were men. We didn't have unclassified or undecided options in those days.

Now it is probable that this is due to dodgy statistics. A *Pouseille* distribution, seems to cry out to be retrieved from the part of my brain that collects useless trivia in the place here the pin numbers and my partners birthday should be; it was something to do with the number of Russian cavalry officers that get kicked by a horse because some don't go near horses.

When I was being bred and buttered, it is more likely that men go up ladders than women. Ladders, whatever Mr Moore reckons, were traditionally sexist boys' stuff. Men, from my perspective, especially old

men, and very especially old men on blood thinners, should keep both feet on the ground. Or hold the ladder firmly with their superior strength while the female partner ascends the ladder.

There are no publicity campaigns about ladders. There are no flags to warn blokes that they are dangerous. No ladder training classes. You can do a course in everything from front end loaders to chain saws at your local TAFE. Ladder training only exists if you join the SES or become a fireman.

I read articles on preventing falls in the elderly. . . although not all the fallers are elderly by any means. One bad one we had was a young guy who was quietly eating his lunchtime pie up his ladder when his mobile went and he tried to find and answer it. Geronimo!

The article said that one third of persons over 65 fall each year and 1 in 10 falls leads to serious injury. "The majority of falls result from interactions between long –term or short-term predisposing factors and short term precipitating factors in a person's environment" Got that? Serotonin antagonists, tricyclics, neuroleptics, benzos, anticonvulsants and antiarrhythmics have strong links to falling. And tilting your head backwards.

There are now, of course, EVIDENCE BASED GUIDELINES for reducing falls which cover assessment, identification of the at risk, and exercise and balance programmes to reduce the incidence, but they don't appear to work really well. But nowhere in the article is the best prevention of all mentioned. I think it is time that all surgeries and bus shelters carried the slogan:

Old males should stay off ladders. (And avoid things with moving blades.)

Terry Maloney accepts the Killara Bowl (Stedman) Trophy on behalf of Killara Golf Club Tuesday 7th August. It is the focus of our twice annual competition with our golfing friends and Terry looks particularly pleased as a KGC win is a rarity! Now here is some information you probably did not know:



The Trophy is an early lignite bowl owned by *James Stedman* and was devised and donated by *Keith Stedman (Dec.)*, his son and a member, nearly 40 years ago. Now here is something else you probably did not know: *James Stedman* was

the founder of **Swee**tacres the makers of Australia's iconic **Minties**. And their famous slogan is something you do know!!

RULE CHANGES IN EFFECT FOR GOLFERS AGE 60 AND OVER

Rule 9.k.34(a): If a tree is between the ball and the hole, and the tree is deemed to be younger than the player, then the ball can be moved without penalty. This is so because this is simply a question of timing; when the player was younger, the tree was not there so the player is being penalized because of his age.



Rule 1.a.5 - A ball sliced or hooked into the Rough shall be lifted and placed on the Fairway at a point equal to the distance it carried or rolled into the Rough with no penalty. The senior player should not be penalized for tall grass which ground keepers failed to mow.

Rule 2.d.6 (B) - A ball hitting a tree shall be deemed NOT to have hit the tree. This is simply bad luck and luck has no place in a scientific game. The senior player must estimate the distance the ball would have travelled if it had not hit the tree, and play the ball from there.

Rule 3.B.3(G) - There shall be no such thing as a lost ball. The missing ball is on or near the course and will eventually be found and pocketed by someone else, thereby making it a stolen ball. The senior player is not to compound the felony by charging himself with a penalty.

Rule 4.c.7(h) - If a putt passes over a hole without dropping, it is deemed to have dropped. The Law of Gravity supersedes the Rules of Golf

Rule 5. - Putts that stop close enough to the cup that they could be blown in, may be blown in. This does not apply to balls more than three inches from the Hole. No one wants to make a mockery of the game.

Rule 6.a.9(k) - There is no penalty for so-called "out of bounds." If penny-pinching golf course owners bought sufficient land, this would not occur. The senior player deserves an apology, not a penalty.

Rule 7.G.15(z) - There is no penalty for a ball in a water hazard, as golf balls should float. Senior players should not be penalized for any short-comings of the manufacturers.

Rule 8.k.9(S) - Advertisements claim that golf scores can be improved by purchasing new golf equipment. Since this is financially impractical for many senior players, one-half stroke per hole may be subtracted for using old equipment.

Please advise all your senior friends of these important rule changes and keep multiple copies in your golf bag. Those not following the rules need to be provided a copy.
