providing members with an opportunity to win!! Prizes will be bottles of wine valued at \$15-20 and selected by a certified som-





More glimpses from her research . . .

The Old Club House

The photograph (below) of the original clubhouse shows two adjoining structures.

Each has a sloping roof rising up to a peak with a finial, then down sharply to a gully, then rise again to second peak, also with a finial and finally slope down to the other side.

The tennis players were allocated the east side while the west was used by anyone, there being no Bowling Club when it was built in 1909.

Both have one room 24 feet by 9 feet (7.3m x 2.7m), with a verandah about 6 feet wide (1.8m) in front.

A lawn is in front of each and low, white painted, wooden fences with one rail separate the areas. Another tall, white painted post and rail fence, divides the whole area from the road.

The photo shows a very well kept piece of ground, surrounded by a flourishing garden and a rockery.

This rockery stayed for many years, first under No 1 Green, then later shifted to below No 3 Green. Lack of space saw its demise.



*J G Edwards* was unusual as a Developer, to set aside such a prime piece of land for communal use. However, this was really due to the fact the area was not suitable for building.

This vision of a Recreation Ground with tennis courts, he felt might entice buyers to come and live in an area with a railway line, but no commerce.

Killara has been fortunate as today it adds to the ambience of the suburb and each club owns their property.

Tennis was the game of choice by residents living on the Upper North Shore and many had their own court. In fact in Wahroonga whole tournaments were played among the locals. It was a hard fought tournament, with the final played at home with a Ballroom, as dinner and dance ended the day's competition

This snippet was related to me by **Mrs Kierle**, whose father was a Gillespie and part owner of the Gillespie Flour Mill. It was there where the final was played due to it's having a ballroom.

## TRIBUTE EDWIN BURTON

An extraordinary dedication and contribution to his club and the sport of Lawn Bowls.

Edwin Burton joined KBC in 1986 (as did his wife, Alice) and immediately became active on the green and soon in club administration. He was particularly interested in the finer points of our game had a

distinguished career as an umpire and coach.

He was appointed as Chairman of Umpires and Club Coach of Killara. In the period from 1991 to 2002 he became a National Umpire; a Level 2 Umpire; National Coach; a Level 2 Coach as well as being Tutor of Candidates for Umpires Certificate.

He was Chairman of Upper North Shore District Umpires Panel from 1992 to 2002 and District Examiner of Umpires.

In the meantime, in 1989, he joined the **NSW Vision Impaired & Blind Bowlers Association** and served as a Committee Member from 1990 to 1999. During that time he served in various senior positions including President and Delegate to the National Blind Bowlers Association and was a Trustee of the Association since 1992.

Following changes to State legislation, he undertook the revision of the Constitution of the NSWVI&BBA to meet the requirements of Dept. of Sport & Gaming to maintain the Association's status for fundraising. His efforts were recognized by the award of Life Membership of NSWVI&BBA and the President's Award from NSW Sports Council for the Disabled for "Outstanding Contribution to the Sport of Lawn Bowls".

Edwin was not content with being very busy with ad-

ministration functions; He somehow found the time to organize eight State Championships and the 1993 National Championships, as well as running coaching clinics in country areas from Armidale to Wagga. Edwin's administrative duties did not impaired his skills on the mat. Competing in the B3 Category, he won **5 State Singles Championships and 4 times Runner-up.** He twice won the *NSW Champion Male Player* award as well as sharing in winning 9 NSW Pairs Championships. He also had success at the National Championships, winning a Bronze Medal in Singles, Bronze and Silver Medals in Pairs and a Gold Medal in the Mixed Pairs in 2000.

As a club member, Edwin was always affable and intensely interested in encouraging new bowlers. His eye-sight, never good, deteriorated to the extent that he became legally blind but he never complained and used a monocular and the assistance of the Skip giving directions from the head. He was 90.

We extend our condolences to his Family with the observation that Edwin and Alice exemplify the very best of our club and community.




### Malcolm's Musings "JUST A LITTLE PRICK"

Many words have more than one meaning. Like the word "prick" I was first exposed to it as a junior anaesthetist. I was about to induce

an octogenarian with a twinkle in her eye, and told her, as was my want, "you will just feel a little prick." She replied, "Don't tell me your troubles, young man." I use little fillers when I am talking to medical audiences to try and break up the science to allow for people with the television induced ten-minute concentration span. When discussing the Sydney Funnel Web Spider, for example, I go on a tour of why it is not a good idea to spray your back yard to kill them.

The reasons are they live underground, I have seen more people hurt by poisonous sprays than spider, there is no evidence that the spray kills them and a possibility that surface spray outside sends the wandering male indoors.. My relief paragraph is "So if you want to kill funnel webs it is best to pour boiling water down their holes." Short pause. "But you have to be careful how you hold them." It usually gets a laugh. In the USA it gets a laugh ten minutes after you say it. The Yanks need time to think about humour that doesn't contain obscenities. Okay, you had to be there.



Some years ago a colleague and I did a study comparing prick testing and intradermal testing in drug allergy in 200 patients who had severe anaphylactic shock to drugs. We found that prick testing was cheaper and less painful, which made it more likely to be successful in children. The results were pretty comparable but it

seemed that intradermal testing was more likely to produce a false positive and prick testing a false negative. We reasoned that in someone who had nearly died from anaphylaxis to a drug the consequences of a false positive were less likely to lead to death, disability and litigation than the consequences of a false negative. This lead to a throwaway line in lectures which mentioned the study. "The differences were marginal. We considered changing to prick testing but because of the potential consequences chose to stay with the forearm."

I was reminded of this the other day when a friendly orthopaedic surgeon collared me and said he had a story I could use in my column. I was all ears. There is a drug called "Discase" that people inject into prolapsed discs. It is made from papayas, I understand. When it was released in the USA it caused a certain amount of anaphylaxis. It therefore became advisable to prick test the patient prior to using it to determine if the patient was allergic to the drug. A little kit is provided for this purpose.

Well the other day my orthopaedic friend was going to use some Discase. And when he opened the test kit he found two ampoules of solution and a note saying he should apply a drop of each solution to the forearm and prick. He was amused by this and showed the bright-eyed pharmacist the instructions and said he thought the instructions left a little to be desired.

The pharmacist responded brightly, "I agree with you entirely, doctor. It should say apply one drop of each solution to the forearm and penis."

He told me that he responded by asking how he should test the ladies and she went off to look it up. I suspect that part was apocryphal. I wondered if one day someone will be stupid enough to try to test the family jewels. According to Murphy's Law, the probability is high. Ho hum. I have also used the throwaway "The blood pressure was up and down like a toilet seat at a mixed party." I cannot remember whom I stole that from.

And I have used but have given up because someone in the USA was offended, a line I stole from Andrew Denton:-

"There is no scientific data to support this argument. Indeed, the argument is fallacious, which comes from the Latin word "fellatio" which means "it sucks."

They had a bye in the first round and played their second round on the morning of 2 October which they won 18:16 over **Wiseman Park**. They returned the following day to play against St Johns Park whose skip is a Grade 1 Pennant player and won by 21:17. The fourth round took place on the morning of 4 October against Merrylands which was played in challenging conditions with heavy and wet green. Ngoc and Louise were able to adapt to the conditions better and won by a convincing score of 20:5.

The weather took a further downward turn in the afternoon when Ngoc and Louise had to play their quarter-finals match against *Debbie Kelly* and *Kim Suckley* from Wiseman Park (ex Dapto). It was raining heavily with all players completely soaking wet. However, all 4 players were determined to finish the match and get into the semi-finals. After playing 18 ends, the score was even at 16:16. They had to play an extra end to find a winner, with Killara winning by one shot!

The semi-finals match took place on Friday morning, 5 October. Killara was neck-to-neck playing against **Bomaberry** until the 11th end when the opposition team took 5 shots, followed by 4 shots in the next end. Killara went down in the end and lost their hope of getting into the final.

#### LATEST RESEARCH




tors back into the market this year.
