A well attended and well conducted dinner/celebration on Friday 29th September, marked the 90th year ot the Killara Bowling Club. A club that reaches this maturity can truly be considered an institution and the fulfilment of the forward vision of our Founders.

The following is taken from the keynote address given by Club Archivist, *Lloyd* Sommerlad

"Our Club was part of the vision of J.G. Edwards, known as the "father of Killara". The area where the Club now stands was once untouched forest, with tall trees on the bank of a creek which provided a rich harvest for the timber cutters who set up a saw pit on what is now our No 2 green. The logs were taken on bullock-drawn jinkers down a rough track to the Lane Cove River where the ex-convict Joe Fidden built his wharf to transport timber from the upper North Shore forests to Sydney Cove.



"Edwards, who was the schoolmaster at Gordon Public School,
was an enterprising character,
had petitioned for a railway line
from the Harbour to Hornsby
as early as 1874 and was instrumental in having a station
built at Killara. In 1893 he
completed the purchase of 160
acres of land known as
"Springdale Estate" originally granted to Jane
McGilvray in 1839, and pro-



ceeded to subdivide it. It included the area from the Highway to Rosebery Rd and from Stanhope Rd to Marion St and Locksley St.

He considered that the land bounded by Arnold St, Werona Ave and Locksley St was not suitable for subdivision and resolved to make a park or recreation ground there. He lined a channel with timber and brick to carry the creek water and levelled ground for three tennis courts. An attempt to form a company to develop the project and form a Sporting Club failed and eventually, in about 1910, Edwards built the courts, a bowling green and a small Clubhouse and leased them to a few enthusiasts. The bowling green was where the southern part of No.2 green is now situated. The Killara Recreational Club Ltd was formed in 1913 for "tennis, bowls and croquet players"; the Clubhouse had a dividing wall with tennis players on one side and bowlers facing their green on the other. JG Edwards was the first President of this Club.

In 1916 the bowlers formed their own Club with about 30 members and rented the green from Edwards but remained affiliated with the Tennis Club. Then in 1919, with a growth in membership and vigorous fund raising, the Killara Bowling Club Ltd was established "to promote all or any of the following games: bowls, skittles and other athletic sports, recreations and pastimes". They purchased the existing green, half the Clubhouse and some additional land from JG Edwards and a tennis court facing Arnold St from the Tennis Club: it later became No. 1 green. The affiliation with the neighbouring Club then ceased but the friendship remained. JG Edwards became the first Patron of the Bowling Club in 1920. The development of Killara Bowling Club from that modest but ambitious beginning is a story for another day."

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KBC Presidents' Platform: John Muirhead

A meeting took place on 23rd September between the KBC Committee and Selectors and Coaches. It was called due to their concern that the Club may be unable to consistently field enough players in both Grades 5 and 7 in the 2007 Pennants season commencing in March.

Some of our more senior players have indicated that they would

prefer not to be selected for 2007 Pennants. Inevitably it is necessary for the Club to find new players to replace those who wish to leave the representative ranks.

It was the consensus that it would be a matter of great regret if the Club was unable to field two sides. It was felt that the loss of competitive play would be likely to cause some of our better players to seek competition elsewhere and that it would lead to a reduction in the general standard in the Club.

Recruitment in 2005-06 produced about eleven new members but few have progressed to preliminary coaching. On the other hand we have been joined by some players of considerable promise.

The meeting decided that the Selectors would make approaches to players they feel have potential and encourage them to take up further coaching and practice.

The Coaches have produced a plan open to all members. It builds on the programme provided for the 2006 season, which addressed the specific skills appropriate for the positions in Fours play. Further coaching and practice must produce only good results and the enhanced enjoyment of bowls which comes from improved skills.

There are ten Pennants rounds played between mid February and early May, half at home and half away. In 2006 our teams came third in both Grades 5 and 7 and all concerned appear to have enjoyed representing our Club in these games.

A notice will go up on the board on which members are invited to indicate their wish to be considered for selection to play Pennants and their availability on the relevant dates.

Another notice will go up setting out the coaching programme prepared by *Edwin Burton*. I strongly encourage all members to take advantage of the coaching offered by our two expert coaches Edwin Burton and *Ed O'Donnell*. Their play and enjoyment will be improved.

I thank the Selectors and Coaches for seeking the meeting. I am confident that our tentative decision to enter two teams for the 2007 Pennants Competition will be vindicated by interest indicated on the lists for coaching and for entry for selection for the Pennants teams.

Members of Killara Women's Club were saddened to learn that one of our longest serving members, *Hazel Edwice Nettle*, died 5th September in her 90th year.

Hazel's health did not permit her to be an active member during her last few years but earlier her record of service and involvement with KWBC and KBC Ltd. was very impressive. Hazel became an Associate Member of our Club while a Full Member of Roseville WBC, in April 1979 and became a Full Member of KWBC in October 1979. She received the Merit pin from NSWWBA for her service to KWBC and in September 1997 and was granted Life Membership.

The following information will indicate why Hazel was so honoured:-

In 1985-86 Hazel became a State Umpire and then a National Umpire and she was very generous with her time in Umpiring Club Matches, Pennant Matches, Club Carnivals etc.

She kept us up to date with any changes in the Laws of Bowls by attendance at the Umpires' Discussion Group.

In addition to her service to KWBC and KBC Ltd., Hazel was very supportive of the Bowling activities of her husband *George* at East Roseville BC, and she received a Merit Pin from RNSWBA for this support.

Hazel gave considerable assistance to our fund raising activities and for many years it was assumed that she would organise the Trading Table during the Spring and Autumn Carnivals - a

considerable source of Club revenue. She also produced considerable sums of money by supplying jams, pickles, plants etc. on Bowling Days throughout the year.

Since 1992, Hazel was our official flower provider and flower arranger and her skill with flowers assured that the Clubhouse always looked very attractive on special occasions with her well loved garden being the source of much of our decorative material. We certainly enjoyed the fruits of her labour to the full. Hazel also supplied and arranged the small vases of artificial flowers' which are used on our tables throughout the year. We are very sorry to have lost such a valued supporter and friend and we send our condolences to George and family at this sad time for us all.

Hazel was almost a Foundation Member of KWBC and can be considered to have been one of the strongest pillars in the development of our Club. We owe her a great deal.

ED 90 Y O'DONNELL ... HOW TO ENJOY YOUR BOWLS

When your children were 7+ years old, you probably took them to training once or twice

each week and to the 'game' on Saturday.

In October the club would like to involve members of the Men's Club in a similar way, in their chosen sport, so that they achieve more satisfaction and enjoyment from their endeavours.

Technique is paramount to your success. Each of you has an individual stamp on your delivery. If your technique is successful, your coach will not change your approach. It is when you are too long, short, across the centre line, unable to find the grassline consistently, or visiting adjacent rinks or over-bowling, that the coach will suggest corrections for **you to practise**.

The errors in your technique may be attributed to:-

- The position of your anchor foot.
- The height you are holding the bowl at the start of your pendulum swing.
- Knees bent too much into a crouching position.
- Not bending from the waist to 'grass' the bowl correctly.
- Dumping the bowl, leading to green damage.
- Coming up and moving to the side of the mat.
- Poor follow through.
- Elbow or wrist bent and flicking at point of delivery.
- Not focusing on a point on the delivery line Do you wait on the mat to watch the run of your bowl to receive the "feed-back" to enable you to visualize the next bowl's trip to the jack? When you develop better skills and find that success is within you, you may find that a little more competition adds to the enjoyment of 'social

competition adds to the enjoyment of 'social bowls'. With this in mind, the coaches would like to see you practising with a view to easing the job of the selectors when they nominate teams to represent your club.

Over the next two months, training will be available to all members. Your improvement may get you to the top. Please put your name on the sheet

on the men's Notice Board to take advantage of this opportunity.

I promised to let you have a few words about the above. There is not a lot to say.


The blazer was sent to us on 27th July by David Prosser of Campbell ACT. It belonged to his father and in a note accompanying it he said

... Darren's PRO-GREEN Report

The GF green has been performing consistently in all conditions. It is wearing well. Fine cutting and a structured rolling program has been employed to provide and smooth, firm, fast, surface.

Water demands for GF are under control and restrictions are followed as required. The watering permit only allows watering on Mondays 1am to 9am and 5pm to 8pm inclusive. Recent rainfalls in the district tallied to approximately 10 inches which was beneficial. Routine spraying was carried out during the rainfalls to soak in much needed fertilisers, soil conditioners, preventative fungicides and insect treatments. Positive feedback has been received from other clubs during the recently hosted Spring carnival. We were also blessed with fine weather over the two days.

Renovations for 2006/07 are in the planning stages. The first green that will be renovated will be GF in mid October.

The HM Green has also stood up well to a heavy workload. Similar techniques carried out on GF have been employed regarding preparation and structured maintenance regimes. Heavy rolling is underway on HM weather permitting.

No 3 Green has been used more frequently of late by members. Generally No 3 green is used for practice and coaching. Heavy rolling is also underway to consolidate the surface. All treatments reported on GF green have been applied to No 3 green.

More use of No 3 green would be beneficial to prevent the overuse and wearing of the other greens.

The gardens and surrounds are looking neat and tidy. Various projects are still underway. The bank on the Western edge of HM has been prepared with Sir Walter Turfgrass. It has taken well and will improve in the warmer months All hedges have been manicured, Shrubs have been pruned, garden beds handweeded and slow release fertiliser applied to various areas. Carpark has been treated with a suitable herbicide, as with all turfgrass banks surrounding greens. Further improvements to our grounds will be addressed to provide long term solutions. Enjoy your bowling!

5-lb. potato sack in each hand, extend your arms straight out from your sides, and hold them there as long as you can. Try to reach a full minute, then relax.

Each day, you'll find that you can hold this position for just a bit longer.

After a few weeks, move up to 10-lb. potato sacks and then 50-lb. potato sacks, and eventually try to get to where you can lift a 100-lb. potato sack in each hand and hold your arms straight for more than a full minute.
