The recent AGM overwhelmingly voted in favour of selling our under- performing poker machines.



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The open day went off well despite very windy conditions. Forty people attended and all left with much praise for a happy inclusive day which included seven Chinese, two Japanese and one Indian. The total number of people we have for reference for follow up work is 92, the extra numbers come from people we met at shopping centres and some rang in their interest.

Attempting to coerce people in the shopping centres is hard work but if done well is very effective. Unless the able bodied members of small clubs step out of their comfort zone the small clubs can't survive. We were unable to do a proper campaign in the shopping centres because of lack of numbers. The main line of resistance to bowling, particularly from women was dress. A lot of women do not want to wear uniform. I think if clubs want to stay relevant they do have to compromise a bit on this issue. If we make dress optional (smart casual or uniform) on the social days i.e. twilight and Sunday, it would be a conducive. The letter drop was spread over a wide area, almost 4500 and by the feedback was very well received, judged as being too good just to throw in the bin. The least value for expenditure was probably the \$550 spent with Cumberland Press. At this stage we have 20 very positive prospects for new membership and the possibility of a total of 30 to 40.

The follow up work is just as important as the open day, hundreds of follow up calls and then the coaching. We desperately need more coaches and assistants.

I am extremely grateful to those who helped. I have conveyed my appreciation personally. It sure separates the wood from the trees. *Rick Edwards More pictures on page 12.*

ED O'DONNELL PENNANTS ARE NEARLY UPON US AGAIN.

In order to raise the standard of the club within the zone the selectors would like those members selected in the club sides to participate in the


training routine, designed by Edwin Burton, during the coming months.

When selected in a pennant team you must realize that you are no longer playing as an individual but as an integral part of a foursome, with specific roles and expectations, under the leadership of the Skip. To become a successful side the three teams must demonstrate that they have the technique and the style to develop a rhythm that distinguishes them from each other and creates confidence among the team. The strength will come from the players, each delivering his bowl with a set purpose, as required by the Skip, in a manner that brings enjoyment to his fellow members. They will develop the confidence that when they step onto the mat there is a sound head to build on. Each must give his all for the improvement of the unit. The pennants operation is not to further the acceptance of Killara B C as the most sociable in the zone, but rather to be the most competitive. During the game you are expected to concentrate on the bowling of your team, not to be a distraction to your player on the mat on your rink or adjoining rinks, by loud questions or hypotheses of various shots. This upsets the rhythm of the team and the side. Yes, it is a game where you interact with your opponent, but use this to your advantage in the competition, not as a hindrance.

The Skip has the most important role to play in the development of rhythm in his team.

A debriefing session after each game to establish where improvements could have been made and errors avoided, should be introduced. Where errors in technique have developed, direct the player to the coach for assistance. The selectors should be informed of any instances where the team needs strengthening. Suggestions as to reforming teams or relocating members, inducting new members and retiring others must be considered.

The first of the training sessions will be devoted to your delivery. Your *MARGIN OF ERROR* will be determined and the coaches will look forward to a reduction in this area during the season. If your technique is wanting and you dump, shoot from the hip, throw the bowl at the jack, or perform in such a way that the Greens Committee recommend that you be restricted to playing on green **4**, **realise that the solution** again is with the person on the mat, (see July Bulletin) it is not a concern of the selectors.
