

At last, with some adjustments . . .

WE HAVE OUR CARPARK!

OUR CONCERTED MAIL CAMPAIGN ON THE EVE OF ELECTIONS WEIGHS THE BALANCE IN OUR FAVOUR . . .

Thanks to the efforts of members and friends, Ku-ring-gai Council approved the Club's Development Application virtually as the last act of it's retirement. **John Muirhead**, who guided this matter for the club, provides this report...

"Ku-ring-gai Council's consent to our Development Application was received on 18th March, some six months since our application was lodged.

Our euphoria quickly evaporated when we examined all of the 43 conditions applicable. The most onerous condition requires us to provide an on-site detention system for storm water from rainfall at the rate of 235 mm per hour for five minutes.

We are planning to use a system for the surface of the parking area which retains the mown grass appearance but reinforces it with precast concrete units so that it is not damaged by the traffic. The system is novel in Council's experience and they are interested to see how it performs.



SCALES TILT IN OUR FAVOUR It has the ability to absorb and retain water and we calculated that it would itself have sufficient capacity to satisfy the onsite detention requirement. The inclusion of the condition has forced us to seek advice from an expert in hydraulics with the aim of persuading the Council that our proposal satisfies their requirement. If this is not successful we hope to do so by making a modest adjustment to kerb details and to the existing drainage pit. We anticipate that our expert will be approaching the Council during the first week in May and that if the approach is successful, we will be able to incorporate any modifications on our plans and prepare specifications very shortly thereafter so that tenders can be called for the work in June."

Many members have expressed interest in the details of the development. John has provided the plan shown on the next page -.


WELCOME BACK SUE!



We have Council permission to build the car park. A matter of detail (potentially expensive) stands in the way of action and

John Muirhead is active now trying to get that detail sorted out. If all goes well we might be able to start work by the end of the calendar year. We have engaged a specialist hydrological engineer to liaise with Council as a first step to getting some resolution.

Our new Green-Keeper is producing greens of which we are proud again. When all two and a half greens are in, we have been asked to move social bowlers around on all greens - and this we shall do. The Cyril South competition was completed successfully and the winning Club (Hornsby) commented publicly on the good organisation of that tournament.

The Board accepted a recommendation that subscriptions for 2004/2005 not be increased. The recommendation came from our Finance Committee. We are in the business of running a good bowling club and our goal is to allow those of us who love the game to continue to play it with congenial people in pleasant surroundings. Naturally we will look at other costs as we go along. So we will address green fees, bar prices and canteen prices sequentially. We will also add to, and replace where needed, other facilities.

A number of matters of contention between the new Green-Keeper and the Club were settled amicably at a meeting in early May. **Bob Hill** and his team are to be congratulated on their oversight of the greens, as are all members who are heeding our wishes that communication with the Green-Keeper be through Bob Hill only. That does not mean that we cannot have civil conversations with Darren or Steve - many of us do. But it does mean that there is only one way they get instructions through Bob Hill - and that is clear and seems to be working well. PAGE 3

Four new umpires have emerged from the Club - congratulations to each of them. They will be welcomed by us all and we have a continuing job of identifying potential umpires and coaches among bowlers. *P.B*



Bankers and Bowlers at Killara Killara is the Bankers'

Bowls Club. Over the years, there has been

an extraordinary number of members who have been senior executives in the banking industry, and they have made outstanding contributions in the management of the Club as well as on the green. And that is still true to-day.

Ross Clark has identified some thirty present and former colleagues from all the major banks, many of them named on the Club's honour boards. **John Woods** was Secretary for five years and was the Club archivist. **Jack Wilson** was President from 1968 to 1971 and **Lew Thomas** from 1979 to 1982, followed by **Norman Winckle** and Ross Clark.

It is in the list of Club Champions that bankers are most prominent. Between 1970 and 1991, the major singles was won 17 times by banking members.

On this list are **D.J.McKay**, **L.D.H.Kerans**, **A.D.Dowell**, **R.S.R.Balcomb** and the top bowler

many members will remember, **Frank Noble** who won the event 13 times. All of them, incidentally, worked at the CBC. Lew Thomas, from the Reserve Bank, was runner up four times but was not able to get the better of Frank in the finals. The names of these champions together with other bankers - **Tom Warren**,

Woods, Thomas, Lee Lee Sanders, Clark and Winckle appear frequently on the honour boards for team events. (Tom Warren was one of our gardeners, responsible for the

flower display which was such a feature of our Club.) Ross Clark and Norman Winckle teamed to win the Minor Pairs in 1976. Bankers still active in the Club have all made important contributions.



Les Cohen joined on retirement from Westpac in 1996, and served on the Bowling Club Committee. Lee Sanders joined the Bank of NSW in 1941,

enlisted in the RAAF the following year and served as a pilot in Bomber Command in the UK. After the war, he returned to the bank in Western Australia and was transferred to Canberra and then to Sydney, retiring in 1983, as State Manager Lending.. He joined KBC in the following year and has served as Chairman of KBC Ltd for three years, Vice-President of the Bowling Club, and currently convenes the Finance Committee. Lee has been

runner-up in the major singles and a

winner in pairs and fours championships. He has played in the top Pennants team for most of his bowling career and is one of our leading skips. He was a member of the No.3 grade side which was runner-up in the Zone Finals in 1997.

Norman Winckle who joined the Club in 1968, is Past Presi-

dent and Patron and Ross Clark, a member since 1971, is Past President and Life Member and was the first Chairman of the Registered Club. He was Killara's delegate to the District Association for 16




years and an executive member of its Match Committee. They have been friends and colleagues since they were students together at Melbourne University in 1939. Both were juniors in the Melbourne office of the Commercial Banking Company of Sydney, both joined the AIF and served in New Guinea and the Islands, Ross in Signals and Norman as a mortar platoon commander in the 8th Infantry Btn. Graduating after the war, they achieved senior positions in the bank. Transferred to Sydney, Norman

became Bank Economist and a General Manager, and also was CEO of the finance subsidiary CAGA.



KWBC President Barbara Cotton. As I understand this is probably the last KBC News prior my hand-over to a new


President, I have conserved space to enable me, at the conclusion of this report, to express my thanks and appreciation to everybody for the support which I have received over the past two years.

Why am I delivering 'wobbly' bowls?

The answer of course is in the faults that have crept into your delivery action. It could be your grip, or the rolling of your wrist at the moment of delivery, or your bowl is too large for your hand, or you are stepping across your grassline. Maybe a combination of some, or all of these.

On a fast green the wobble will work itself out as the rolling forces dominate, and your bowl will proceed towards the head. Probably it will be short. On a slow green the wobble will probably cause your bowl to run straight and end up short of your objective.



Here is a suggested list of some of the conditions you might investigate as being contributing factors to your problem.

Incorrect grip. The parallel lines of the large rings, or dimples on your

bowls, should continue through your wrist and forearm to your shoulder during the pendulum swing of your delivery. Check your grip.

- **Twisting your wrist** in your **backswing** and not returning it to the correct position at the moment of delivery.
- Twisting your wrist at the moment of release.
- In both these cases the thumb pushes the top of the bowl towards the inside of your grassline, on the forehand, thus creating the wobble.
- Is your **middle finger** lying along the middle of the running surface of the bowl?
- Your **thumb may be too high** above the rings or dimples on top of your bowl. This will also impart a force across the line of delivery.
- On **your backhand**, if you step across your grassline, (have your leading foot pointing at the head and not along your grassline) then at the bottom of your swing your thumb will influence your delivery and possibly introduce wobble.

It is important that the bowl leaves your hand at the bottom of your swing, a short distance in front of your leading foot, without any 'bump'. It must roll out of your hand off the middle finger. Your wrist and elbow must be straight and firm as your hand follows through along the grassline. Bring your hand up to about the height of your knee and watch your bowl continue along that delightful curve up to the 'jack'.

Tom was based in Malta during the period of its heavy bombardment, and was a recipient of the George Cross 50th anniversary medal issued by the Republic of Malta, which had been awarded the George Cross for the gallantry of its civil population.





As has become a tradition, Anzac Day was marked by a BBQ luncheon, Flag Ceremony and Address followed by mixed bowls.

It was a fine clear day, and the Oration, given by George Wall, was memorable. With all eyes on the Flagstaff, Barker student, Sam Barclay, performed The Last Post with clarity and sensitivity. And then the closure of the Ode to the Fallen. Few occasions evoke emotion as much as this 'Celebration'.

All would have been greatly moved by Georges' address which was clearly extensively researched and thoughtfully constructed. With his permission, we provide the following extract for members who not in Killara that day

"In all major Australian Capitals there is a Shrine of Remembrance, a place which may well be called our sacred site, a place of solemn reflection. In Sydney we have the Anzac War Memorial in Hyde Park.

Perhaps it is not visited as often as it should as it is located on the edge of the City but this does not detract from the fact it is an imposing and magnificent building with a message for each and everyone of us. The architect was Bruce Delit who appointed a sculptor, Raynor Hoff, to work with him. Hoff had served in France during the War and this becomes apparent when one looks at the sixteen figures of servicemen and women seated on the buttresses of the building. It is when one enters the memorial that the stark message of the awfulness of war ... the great personal loss and suffering ... is made so apparent. In the centre of the building the visitor looks

down onto the lean and delicate figure of the dead warrior lying naked spread-eagled on sword and shield representing the sacrifice of so many young men in the maelstrom of war. This figure is supported in turn by the figures of three women. Who do these women represent? Mother, Sister, Wife, Daughter, or Lover? They are the ones bearing the weight of the great sacrifice. The warriors suffering has ended but theirs is for ever. The pain and anguish is not confined to just those who fought and died but to the people who loved them and have kept them in their hearts forever.

It is our duty and the duty of all Australians to continue to remember and honour those, Lost and Living, who have given so much so we may live in peace and freedom...."

John Krieger Reports on PLACE OF **ORIGIN**

The first match of the series for 2003/2004 was played on Sat.

15th November, which also turned out to be the first real day of summer with temperature on the greens rising to 35c which was a real test of condition and stamina for all participants.

Edwin Burton makes the Umpires call . . . The Marker



One of the most interesting tasks a bowler may undertake is that of marker for a singles match.

It is an opportunity to study the tactics and shot selection of the players and compare them with your own assessment of the shot to be played. It is a responsible position requiring full attention to the game, total impartiality, avoiding any comment on the quality or luck of any shot and not offering advice of any sort to the players. During the trial ends is the time to become familiar with the distinctive insignia on each player's bowls.

The marker shall centre the jack, placing a full length jack 2 metres from the front ditch in accordance with Law 19. The player who delivered the jack is responsible for ensuring that it is correctly centred. Law 38D. If the marker considers that the jack was rolled less than 21 metres the marker must call the umpire for a measure, even if the players are satisfied with the length of the roll. Law 64A(iii)(b).

While play is in progress the marker should stand 2 metres beyond the jack and halfway between the centre line and the side of the rink as per Law 64A(iii)(c) At each alternate end, having centred the jack, the marker should update the scoreboard while at the marker should update the scoreboard while at the same time watching the first delivery in case it be-comes a toucher. Touchers must be marked immedi-ately they come to rest. *Law 24*. If it is not marked before the next succeeding bowl leaves the hand of the next to play it ceases to be a toucher. *Law 24(ii)* The opponents in singles shall decide if a bowl is dead - *(Law 26(ii)* The marker must not remove a bowl from the rink (other than a non-toucher in the ditch) before the opponents have reached agreement. before the opponents have reached agreement. The marker has no authority to lift a bowl or jack in the head which must be protected at all times by stopping a bowl from another rink before it causes a displacement. Law 64A(iii)(f)

Be ready to answer promptly any question from the player on the mat but do not offer additional information not specifically requested. The most common question asked is "What is the position?". This is a request for the number of shots up or down not for an indication of who owns each bowl in the head. If the shot bowl is not clear, an answer such as "It is a measure but I favour your bowl(or your opponents bowl) is quite satisfactory.

At the completion of an end wait without comment for the opponents to declare the result of the end, enter the result on the score card, announce the progressive

scores, then move quickly to the other end, keeping well away from the centre line so as to avoid any interruption to the rolling of the jack.

The players may request the marker to measure for shot. If the marker is unable to determine which bowl is shot, the umpire should be called.

At the end of the match have both players sign the card and deliver it to the Controlling Body. By maintaining concentration on the match, avoiding involvement in conversation with spectators, anticipating possible questions, answering questions briefly and accurately, markers can make a valuable contribution to a match and avoid causing delays irritating to the participants. 

the ladder . . .

The Singles Ladder is an informal competition to be played outside organised playing times, which provides great opportunity for practicing your whole range of shots under

competitive but non-stressful conditions. There is no need to arrange a marker. The Conditions are set out on a notice next to the Ladder which is adjacent to the Board where the competition draws are displayed.

The initial positions on the ladder were established by a random draw and additional entrants will start at the bottom of the list. A competitor may only challenge the player on the rung one above him. If the challenger wins he will move up one place and the defeated player will move down. If a challenge is issued, three weeks is allowed for the game to be played; otherwise the players will change places on the ladder. {Please note that each player will place \$2 green fee together with the score card in an envelope in the competition box, and the **Bowls Secretary** will change the board.} The game consists of the best of 3 sets. The winner of a set is the first to reach 7 shots. If commenced by 10.30 in the morning it should be finished in time to allow play in the normal organised games in the afternoon. As with other competition games, intending players should enter the starting time in the diary in the Roll-up room, for the information of the greenkeeper.
