





Finally, I thank my fellow Directors for the manner in which they have reacted to the pressure I have put on them for the last few weeks, it has been a very difficult time as things have moved so quickly and they have all responded extremely well.

I hope you and your families remain fit and healthy in the coming months, I fear we could be in for at least a six month bowling holiday, and that we can get together on the green sooner than expected.

Wear proper bowls shoes. They have special soles designed to avoid scuffing of the surface which you won't find in other shoes


On arrival at the green, after removing a bowl from your bag, place it on the green. Dropping a bowl or tossing it onto the green causes indentations in the surface.

When bowling, try to release the bowl close to the ground and close to your front foot. This will avoid indentations caused by dropping or throwing the bowl.


