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# Marking 10 years of publication

This is the 40th edition of Killara Bowls News (KBN) in this format, introduced ten years ago by this Editor. There have, of course, been other KBC Club newsletters with note-worthy editors including *Lloyd Sommerlad, Wyman Morell* (Dec.) and *Ron Beer* (dec.) However, it is believed that this series has been the most consistent for regularity, content and production quality.

#### Some interesting statistics

KBN was first published January 2003 and has continued approximately quarterly to the present 40th edition. Most editions have been of 10 or 12 pages with the occasional 8 or 14 pager. In all, 440 pages have been published.

#### What does it cost?

About 120 copies are printed and distributed each quarter. (Earlier, before email distribution, at least 200 copies were printed and many mailed.) Printing internally, each page costs about 2.5 cents for printing plus paper at around \$6.00 per ream; the average edition costs about \$56 to produce. Over these 10 years, the Editor has watched 52,800 pages come off the press for assembly and stapling. A stimulating activity!

#### Your newsletter makes a profit!

While each issue costs \$56 to produce, the newsletter generates advertising revenue. About \$400 net per edition. So that each issue contributes about \$340 to general revenue. Over these ten years that's \$13,600.


#### **Production Aspects**

Almost certainly, newsletters prepared before the advent of word processing would have been by Mimeograph/ Duplicator/Roneo. A very messy and tedious method. **And** a very

painful one if you made a single mistake ... .you had to start all over!. Illustrations were very difficult. These days, the combination of publication software, digital photography and resources available on the internet, make things much simpler. From the beginning, KBN has been produced in full colour although only those who read their copy on the Club's website or via email circulation would be aware. So it is an indulgence that this issue has at least has some colour on the front page!


My Grandma you should see, Please 'Copy, Scan' and 'Paste' her, And send her back to me.



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
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# Good advice from our Colleague and Major Sponsor . . .

## POSITIVE INVESTMENT OPPORTUNITIES THROUGH NEGATIVE GEARING

Even though negative gearing offers investors sound rental investment opportunities through tax advantages, the term is often misunderstood by many people, according to Mr Phillip Johnson of LJ HOOKER ST IVES

"To many people, the term 'Negative Gearing' conjures images of shady deals and tax evasion. However, it is simply the method of structuring a property portfolio and finances to fully utilise the tax benefits available," said Mr Johnson.

"Put simply, a negatively geared property is one in which costs incurred by the investor in respect of their property, are greater than the income received from the tenants"

"Costs can include interest charged on money borrowed to finance the purchase of the property in the first place, property management fees (which are often calculated as a percentage of rental payments) charged by a real estate agent, water rates, council charges and repairs to the property"

"Gearing' refers to an investment which has been financed partly by borrowed funds. Investors can deduct all interest payments when servicing a loan used to produce a rent producing property"

"The interest payments are a deduction and may be claimed against other assessable income on the tax return"

"Where the interest expense is greater than the rental income, the property produces a loss and is referred to as being 'negatively geared'", said Mr Johnson.

"Any surplus income generated by one property may be used to re-pay the loan on other properties, therefore converting taxable income into a tax deduction"

"The investor is able to take advantage of the obvious tax benefits and can therefore increase a portfolio of what is one of the safest and best forms of investment available"

"The money invested in property through negative gearing benefits the entire economy through its positive multiplier effect on all other industries linked both directly and indirectly to the property industry," Mr Johnson added.
