



CELEBRATING MILESTONES CONTINUED

In the April newsletter (KBN#59), I described the stylish seven days of events which marked the 50th Jubilee and the discovery of a

Foundation Day Toast 1986 (Part 2) By Gordon Brogden, Vice President KBC.

... "However, in spite of all the anxiety, sorrow and demands WWI was making on our community, a number of residents combined to establish the Club which we honour this evening.

It is interesting to know that the owner of this area, some years prior to 1916, constructed on this site - tennis courts, a bowling green and a club house.

A large and popular tennis club soon flourished.

Meanwhile six men tried to establish a bowling club. They did the playing while the owner cut the grass and kept the green in a reasonable condition.

After a year or two the Bowling Club folded and the property owner leased the green to the Tennis Club for several years at a fee of twelve pounds per annum.

In 1916 a number of sympathetic bowlers were enlisted and a club formed which grew and flourished.

The Club soon provided the sporting activities and fellowship which are the necessary ingredients for a happy and satisfying life.

Last week whilst perusing records of Killara happenings, I was attracted to the comments made in 1921 by an elderly resident.

They serve to give us some idea of what this area was like in the days of early settlement.

Now the giants of the forest are gone, the curlew and the lyre-bird are heard no more, the orange trees with their white September blooms, the young spring leaves and golden fruit nestling among them, have all vanished and it is if they have never existed.

The ridges which were bedecked with Waratahs, the creeks where Christmas Bush formed a mantle of red, alongside Boronias which revelled in their primeval beauty, all now have ceased to exist'.

The original Killara must have been a beautiful area and we can understand the elderly gentleman's sadness, but let me say this - He would be comforted if he could return today and observe the greens and surrounding colourful gardens, currently existing in this particular location under the name of Killara Bowling Club.

Let our continued loyalty to the Club and our adherence to the principles of sportsmanship ensure that this Club will continue to exist as implied by the name 'Killara -'Permanent, Always Here'." *Vice President *Gordon Brogden* must have been delegated to give this speech by *Ross R Clark* who was President 1985/88. It was during Ross' tenure that **Killara Bowling Club Ltd**. was established and uniquely, he was also Chairman of the new entity.

Ross was a member for 33 years and died (83), as a Life Member, in August 2004. His obit is in KBN#7 December 2004.

Helen Clark, his spouse, was also a member for 33 years and Patron of KWBC. She passed (91) in June 2014 ten years later.

Her tribute is in KBN #44 July 2014. rhb

KNOW THE LAWS



28F Displacement by a Bowl from an Adjoining Rink

- (i) Any bowl at rest on the rink, if in danger of being moved by a bowl from an adjoining rink, may be lifted by either director to allow the neutral bowl to pass, and then be replaced, provided such action would not influence the outcome of the head.
- (ii) Either director may stop a bowl from an adjoining rink which is in danger of colliding with a bowl in the head and shall stop a bowl which appears likely to collide with the jack. The bowl which has been stopped shall be replayed provided it was delivered on a bias which would have resulted in it reentering its own rink.

*Professor Malcolm Fisher AO MB CHB, MD, FFARACS, FFICANZCA, FRCA

Director of the Northcare Foundation since April 1997. Malcolm was Head of the Intensive Therapy Unit at Royal North Shore Hospital from 1984 to 2003;a foundation member and past President of the Australia and New Zealand Intensive Care Society, and past President of The World Federation of Societies of Intensive and Critical Care Medicine. His expertise in Anaphylactic shock is recognised worldwide and he has published over 100 scientific papers and articles and edited two monographs. He is internationally regarded as a lecturer and for his writings on ethical aspects of Intensive Care. He has been awarded the degree of MD from the University of Otago for his research into anaesthetic anaphylaxis.

In 1994 he was awarded an honorary diploma of the UK College of Anaesthetists and in 1995 received in the USA the Christer Grenvik Memorial Award for international leadership in Critical Care Ethics, and the Thomas Iberti Memorial Award for International excellence in Critical Care. In 1996 Fisher received the Alan Gilston Medal of the UK Intensive Care Society for International Leadership in Intensive Care. He is the editor of two books and the author of over 150 scientific articles.

In 1976 he received the Gilbert Brown Prize of the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons for Outstanding Research presentation by at the Annual Scientific Meeting.

He received the AO for national and international services to Intensive Care in 2003.

"HE paid for our house at the lake."


"HE paid for your Golf Trip to St Andrews and your new car."

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PROFILE **Alan Vine**

Born in Merrriwa NSW Alan, at the age of six, moved to Sydney attending primary schools at Narrabeen and Vaucluse before moving to **Cranbrook Bellview Hill** where he completed the leaving certificate and thence to University. On graduation he joined **Price Waterhouse** as an Audit Clerk.

Alan's real passion was to get involved in farming and so he joined **International Harvester Co** and worked his way up the Company, starting as a Sales rep and then Zone manager based at Dubbo for a number of years where he met and married *Trish*. Promotion meant moving so Alan was soon transferred to Perth, as State Sales Manager Farm Equipment; two years later to Brisbane again as Sales manager. Then to Melbourne where he became the Company's Product Manager.

International Harvester, at that time, was the world's largest manufacturer of farm equipment, trucks and construction equipment with 23 factories in USA and 25 around the world. The operation in Geelong had both engineering facilities and manufacturing plant for Farm equipment and Trucks. It was however a giant in trouble. A clash between management and the **United Auto Workers Union** resulted in a 12 month strike leading to Chapter II and Bankruptcy. It was the world's largest corporate crash at the time.

In Australia, the pieces were picked up and a new Company, **Case IH**, was formed and based in Parramatta. Alan and family moved to Sydney as Product Manager and established their home in St.Ives.

The association with agricultural machinery came to an end when Case IH announced plans to move west to St Marys. It was too much travelling and Alan resigned and purchased an Electrical Repair Business based in St Ives near his home. This business called **Don House Electronics** was well known in the appliance TV and Video business. Alan conducted this business for 15 years before closure and retirement. Alan's union with Trish must cause some consternation when it comes to State of Origin. *Edwina* was born 1975 in Sydney. *William* was born 1977 in Perth; then onto Brisbane and *James* came along in 1980. Another move to Melbourne in 1981, where *Fiona* was born in 1982. They have now lived at St Ives for more than 30 years and all children are now married giving Alan and Trish seven grandchildren. 

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
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




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South African Parliament Honourable Madisha: Half of people in this parliament are stupid!


