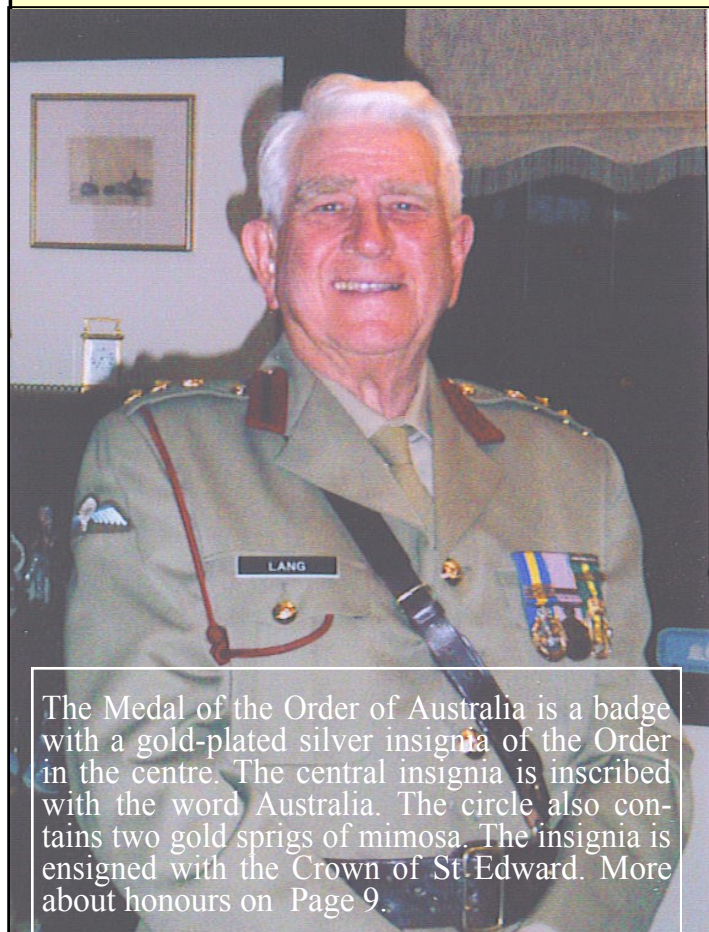

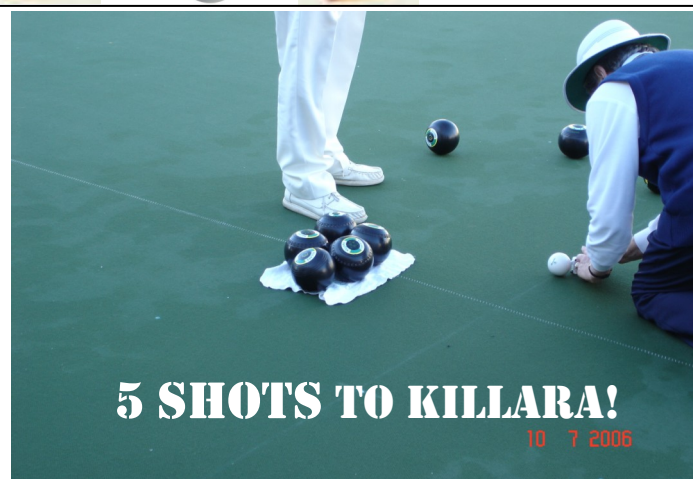

Since the last newsletter we have gained 14 new members, full or

social. Some of these came from the efforts of the drive organized by **Graham Shirley**, who is presently recovering from knee replacement surgery and hopefully will be back to the club and bowls shortly.

Our financial results for the nine months to March showed about a 'line ball' situation which we expect to maintain until the 30th of June. As a result we have been able to leave subscriptions unchanged for 2006/2007, viz. men \$275; women \$250; intermediate \$100 and social \$15. Sue has gained a new frig and Freezer when it's predecessor gave 'up the ghost'. Thanks to **Lea McNeill** for choosing and organizing the replacements.

The Landings Superbowl competition created a lot of interest this year. A separate report appears on page 6 of this newsletter. The final has not been played when the writer prepared this report. Our finals team, **Ian Cameron-Smith, Alice Burton, Jean Brierley** and **Michael Tsolakis** have a good chance. *Good luck!*

The Dept. of Sports and Recreation have some money available and with the support of a club member we could install suitable shades for a cost of \$1000 to the club. On this basis we have applied to the Dept. for a grant. The outcome may not be known until the end of the year.

Lloyd Sommerlad on Club Traditions

Keith Stedman was present on the day of the 2005 competition and passed on this front page from *Bowling Life* published in 1932 and found under the floor covering of a house at Bendemeer in northern NSW and now in our archives.



Some time in the late 1940's, Killara Bowling Club and KGC commenced a bi-annual match played March and August. After the discussions on trophy, it was left to Alex Phillips and Jack Kyd to devise something suitable. They came up with a wooden bowl of Vitae Lignum, "wood of life", mounted on a base. All original bowls were made out of wood (you can't imagine Sir Frankie Drake using plastic can you?) and as this particular timber was so hard, it was eminently suitable.

The iconic bowl was donated by Keith Stedman, the grandson of James Stedman of J. Stedman Henderson Sweets Ltd., manufacturers of "Sweetacres" brand confectionary.

An aging James used this wooden bowl until his coach advised him to come up to date and buy some of these "new fangled plastic things". Our trophy was first played for in 1979 but the bowl thereon would be at least 80 years old. The name of this much fought over useless piece of kitsch is the "Killara Bowl". (A bit like the "America's Cup" really!) Although named the Killara Bowl it is erroneously referred to as the "Stedman Bowl" after having been used by James and donated by Keith.

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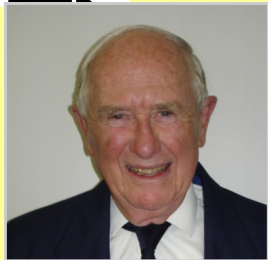

Points for Consideration Before the Next Carnival

2. Advise players on the days of the Triples that winners playing winners & losers playing losers will not necessarily apply where the number of teams does not divide by 4.
3. An open draw should prevail to maintain the credibility of the Carnival.
4. Sponsor representatives to be asked to arrive in plenty of time to make their presentations.

BACK TO THE LANDINGS ... 2006 SUPER BOWL

The Club was pleased to receive another invitation from *The Landings* to participate in a second series of competition for North Shore clubs at their 'roof-top Green'. KBC were highly successful last year making a 'clean sweep'. (see KBN September 2005)

In this years competition, we faced sides from **Belrose, East Roseville, Gordon, Lindfield, St.Ives and Turramurra**. Lindfield took the \$5,000 sponsorship prize with the teams prize still to be determined when we went to press.



The Landings rinks are synthetic (very fast and wide!) and much shorter than standard; imposing a severe test of bowling skill and concentration. Get it only slightly wrong and you are 'in the ditch'. There were some great matches observed on some occasions by over 100 spectators.

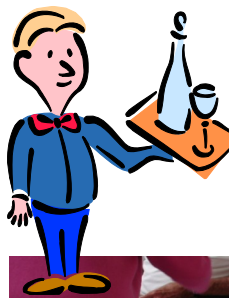
Super Bowl Rules and Bonus points (Summary Version)

Toucher bonus points

One bonus point is scored when a delivery touches the jack and comes to rest within 60cm of the jack and remains within the boundaries of the rink. The scorecard includes a narrow coloured left hand column to enter the bonus points. Toucher/Bonus points are added as each end is scored. *Touchers are not chalked and have no special status.*

Kill bonus point

A kill bonus point can only be scored by either of the opponents killing the end with their last bowl of that end. The player intending to kill the end must call aloud "kill!" and that call must be acknowledged prior to the kill shot being played. It is scored as for touchers. A killed end is not replayed.



GREAT HOSTS

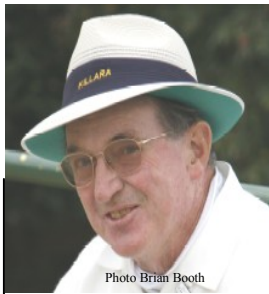

ED O'DONNELL DICUSSES ... THE USE OF THE MAT.

Fundamental in 'Grooving your Delivery' is the placing of your **anchor** foot on the mat, when you take your stance. The coaching segment in the 'Women's Bowls News' for June,

has an article on the way you can use the mat to your advantage.

The correct alignment of your feet on the mat, in the direction of your delivery line, will overcome the common fault of delivering your bowls across the head. Well - this is one factor you can work on. Next you can think about follow through; not lifting your head; **walking off** the mat; and all those other characteristics of the perfect delivery.

Try this in your next practice, as an aid to finding the correct grassline, using the holes in the mat. When you have mastered this, the changing of the position of the mat for short or long ends will no longer create a problem for you when determining your aiming point.

Place the mat on the centre line near the T with the diamonds on the line. Take your stance as if to deliver the jack, but deliver four bowls on the forehand bias using the centre line as your delivery line. Take the front end of the line as your aiming point and deliver your bowls carefully along this line. Watch each bowl as it bends off the centre line onto the adjacent rink. Notice how your bowls have all come to rest in a straight line from the back of the mat. (See fig.1)

Now swing the mat about the back diamond until the sewn centre line points along the line on which your bowls have finished. Look where the rink centre line comes out from under the mat. (See fig 2). Which hole on the mat matches this point: or between which two holes does it lie? The line from the back diamond to this point on the front of the mat, gives you your delivery line.

Select a point on the rink out along this line about four or five metres, as your aiming point. Once this point is chosen do not take your eye off it until your bowl passes over it on its way to the jack.

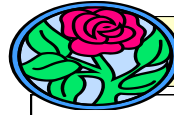
Now, if on your back swing your bowl stays over this line, you will always be rewarded with bowls finishing on the centre line. Weight of course, is a matter requiring further practice.

When you step onto the mat from the back, make sure your anchor foot is placed parallel to this line so that you can deliver your bowl along this line over your aiming point. See adjacent illustration. *Good bowling! Ed*

What year did you choose?

Frankly, it would be remarkable if you could determine the year as there has been very little change from this perspective.

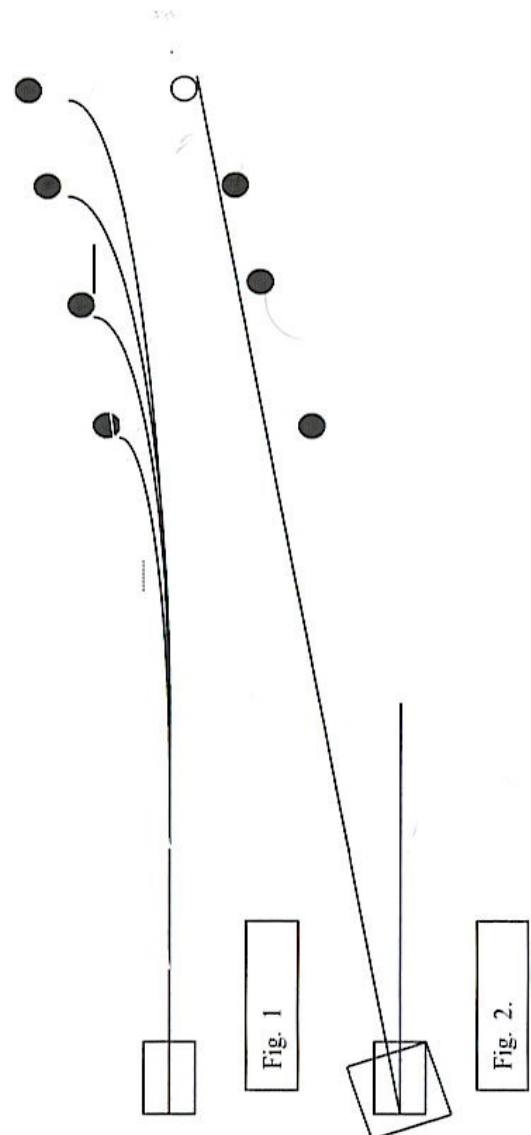

IT'S AN HONOUR

In the Australian honours system appointments to the Order of Australia confer recognition for outstanding achievement and service. The **Medal of the Order of Australia** is awarded for service worthy of particular recognition. We were therefore delighted to see a member of our club recognized in the traditional Australia Day list.

How it is awarded

The order of Australia is the pre-eminent way Australians mark the achievements and service of their fellow citizens. Nominations to the Order come directly from the community: either individuals or groups. Once a nomination has been submitted the **Honours Secretariat** at Government House in Canberra conducts further research and contacts referees. **The Council for the Order of Australia** then considers the nominations. The Council makes its recommendations, independent of government, direct to the Governor-General.

... Darren's PRO-GREEN Report

The Graham Firth Green has been performing very true with consistent pace in varying conditions. The green is wearing well with no significant worn areas to be concerned about. Fine cutting and a structured rolling program has been employed to provide a smooth, firm, fast, surface.

Water demands are under control and restrictions are followed as required. The watering permit only allows watering on Mondays 1am to 9am and 5pm to 8pm inclusive.

Recent rainfalls in the district tallied to approximately 8" which was very beneficial. Routine spraying was carried out during the rainfalls to soak in much needed fertilisers, soil conditioners, preventative fungicides and insect treatments.

Positive feedback has been received by bowlers from other clubs on the vast improvements to the GF green during the recently hosted autumn carnival. State singles and pairs matches have also been hosted proving the greens are up to top level standards for these premier events.

Renovations for 2006/07 are in the planning stages, various techniques are in consideration to further improve No 1 green for our playing members.

The Hillary Moore Green has also stood up well to a heavy workload. Similar techniques have been applied.

Heavy rolling is underway weather permitting. General winter

turf management is underway and all necessary procedures will be completed.

No 3 Green is being used more frequently for practice and coaching. Barefoot bowls is also being promoted and it provides an ideal surface for this. Heavy rolling is also underway to consolidate the surface. All treatments reported on No 1 green have been applied to No 3 green. *We suggest more use of No 3 green would be beneficial to prevent the overuse and wearing of the other greens.*

I am often asked about accurately measuring the speed of a bowling green

The bowl must travel within 0.5 metres (2 feet) of a measured 28 metre (90 feet) distance. Timing commences when the bowl passes the toe of the mat and finishes when the bowl stops. This process should be repeated until an accurate bowl has been measured. A speed of 14 seconds is considered appropriate and realistic.

The gardens and surrounds are looking neat and tidy. Various projects have been completed and some are still underway. The bank on the western edge of HM has been prepared with Sir Walter Turfgrass. It has taken well and will improve in spring. All hedges have been manicured, shrubs have been pruned, garden beds hand-weeded and slow release fertiliser applied to various areas. Carpark has been treated with a suitable herbicide, as with all turfgrass banks surrounding greens. Further improvements to our grounds will be addressed to provide long term solutions.
