

Seasons greetings to all members of Killara Bowling Club Ltd from all at KWBC and good bowling for 2007.



The following are extracts from the eulogies jointly given by his sons Geoff and Tim:-

"John Hugh Krieger was born on September 27, 1933, the son of Trudy and Fritz Krieger and brother of Andrew.

He was educated at Sydney Grammar School, graduating in 1951. He enjoyed his days at the school and remained an active member of the Old Sydneyians Association, celebrating their 50^{th} reunion in 2001.

After leaving school, dad commenced his career in the wool trade, a career which spanned over 45 years and lasted until his retirement in 1998.

Of course, one of the other defining and long lasting influences in his life was his marriage to Pam. TEN YEARS YOUNG

In August KBC celebrated the tenth anniversary of the Place of Origin Matches, which were instituted in December 1996 by the then President. The trophy is the painting by Werner Filipich - "Longueville". Each club year three matches are played to determine the side which is to hold the trophy for the ensuing year.

The August match - the final match in the Tenth Series - was postponed for a week because of rain. The Rest won the match 117 shots to 89. Sydney had won the first match 126 shots to 105, while the second match had ended in a close result. The Rest winning 118 shots to 116. The Rest have won seven of the ten series over the years from 1996/7 to 2005/6: two of the seven victories were "clean sweeps" (three matches to none), albeit that the outcome of some of the other series has been close.

It was a pleasant warm day in the midst of the volatility of the weather of recent weeks, and thirty-six members seized the opportunity. The Rest won 118 shots to 112. Edwin Burton ... KNOW THE LAWS.

Lawn bowls is probably the only sport played internationally which does not have a set of Rules which are observed by all countries for all levels at which the

game is played. The World Bowls Board has endeavoured to achieve this with the Crystal Mark issue of Laws. This I has been thwarted by Bowls Australia modifications from Domestic Regulations (DR) & RNSWBA Conditions of Play (CoP).

While the new Laws which apply from 1st January 2007, are similar to the Laws currently being used, there are significant changes. The following notes highlight those which are most likely to be encountered regularly.

Possession of the Mat

The Skip winning the toss or the previous end may pass the of the Skip. Laws 37 & 39 mat to the opposition team which places the mat, rolls the jack & plays first. Laws 18.2 18.4 The mat should be placed A toucher should be marked before the next bowl comes to with the centre line of the mat on the centre line of the rink rest. If not so marked the bowl ceases to be a toucher. with the front edge of the mat not less than 2 metres from Incomplete Ends the rear ditch or less than 25 metres from the front ditch. If players leave the green before an end is completed eg. Law 19.

| Rolling the Jack

The minimum legal roll of the jack is 23 metres after being centred, measured from the centre of the mat line. Should the jack be improperly rolled i.e. less than 23 metres, out of bounds or into the ditch or from an improper stance on the mat, the jack is then rolled by the opposing lead. Should each lead improperly roll the jack once, the jack is placed on the 2 metre mark and the mat placed in any legal position by the first to play. Law 22, 23.



Foot faulting

A rebounding jack must come to rest not less than 20 metre from the centre of the mat line, otherwise the end is dead. Laws 30.1

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The Scorecard

The card should be kept by the player playing second. On completion of the game the Skips should enter on the card the time of completion of the game, sign the card and hand it to the Controlling Body. Law 37.3.1

Re-spotting the Jack

It is only in Sets Play or if the Conditions of Play for a particular competition eg. our Autumn & Spring Carnivals that there are no dead ends and the jack is re-spotted. Law 15.5 Director

The term Director and the responsibilities of that position have been removed from the new Law Book. The player playing immediately before the Skip is now restricted to protecting the head, marking touchers and determining the result of the end. All other decisions are the responsibility

Touchers

due to inclement weather, when play resumes the end is treated as dead and the end replayed, unless all bowls had been delivered before the stoppage and it only remained to determine the result. In this situation, when play resumes on the same day, the result is then determined. Law 50

Before delivering a bowl or jack, a player should take a stance on the mat with one foot fully on the mat. At the time of delivery, one foot should be wholly or partly on or over the mat. Law 20

BOWLS ADMINISTRATION IN NSW



I would suspect that very few of our some 200 members, men and women, would readily know the badge on the left; and even after it divining its function, understand the importance of Zones in the administration of

our great game. Let's talk about our Zone:-Zone 9, more formally Sydney Northern District Bowling Association – Zone 9 Inc., is the body responsible for the administration of men's lawn bowls on behalf of the State controlling body, the Royal NSW Bowling Association. Located in the Sydney Northern suburbs and Northern beaches area – geographically from Sydney Harbour north to the Hawkesbury River and generally east of the pacific Highway. It is one of 5 Sydney metropolitan zones within the 16 zones comprising the whole of New South Wales.

The Zone has 40 accredited clubs which have a total membership of approximately 4000 male bowlers and slightly fewer women bowlers. The women's District has somewhat different boundaries than the men's Zone 9.

The Zone's responsibilities include:

•arranging the conduct of Zone competitions including Zone Championships, Pennants, Mid-Week Triples, Rookie of the Year etc

selecting teams to represent the Zone in various inter-zone competitions throughout the year
overseeing the implementation of the Laws of the Game within it's accredited clubs and accrediting coaches and umpires ensuring the maintenance of standards of club greens

The present Zone was created in 1995 when the State was restructured into 16 zones and again in 2004 when the previously existing 2 Districts – Upper North Shore District Bowling Association and the Northern Suburbs District Bowling Association – were abolished.

There are, of course, a large number of dedicated clubmen who volunteer their time and energy to make things happen. *John Krieger* was our representative until his recent death.

MAKING A MODERN BOWL

Lawn bowls today are made from a hard plastic called

Phenolformaldehyde. All manufacturers use powders with different

specific gravities to achieve their desired weights for the various models. The powder manufacturer has to design the powders to suit the moulder's requirements of flow characteristics, colour, surface finish, etc. After the ingredients are blended, the initial process to produce the powder can commence which involves both heat and pressure. The chemical bonding process begins at this point, and the resulting "cake" is ground to the powder size specified by the moulders. Checking that the specific gravity is correct is a regular feature throughout the production and can be altered to ensure conformity to the requirements of the customer. Next is the moulding of the blank. It is believed that the



moulding "blank" for a bowl is the largest solid mass of Phenol compound moulded successfully. Before the powder is placed into the mould it is passed through a radio frequency preheater which ensures that the moisture is removed and

that the "cake" is heated right through. This also restarts the chemical bonding process and thus helps reduce the time required in the mould. After the pre heating is completed the "cake" is put into a computer-controlled 160 tonne compression moulding press, the platens of which, are heated to 200°C. The "cake", which is then pressed into the final shape, remains in the press for 5.5 minutes and then merges as a blank ready for the computer-controlled lathes.

The blanks are then left to cool under controlled conditions so that the full cure can be successfully completed. Then they are sonic-checked for voids before being ready for use.


Composition blanks are carefully inspected and electronically weighed, the first of many inspections which are carried out during the course of production.

The material is so hard and abrasive blanks

are turned using diamond tools. Consistency of shape and performance is ensured by the use of computer controlled machinery.

Various templates and gauges are used to ensure accuracy of shape, size and weight to ensure compliance with WBB (World Bowls Board) requirements. Computers are also used to engrave the sets of 4 bowls. At this point the set has its unique set number, serial





After engraving, painting of the print and emblems is carried out to enhance the appearance of the bowls. This also Aids identification when in play.

Final testing using the approved and licensed test table. All bowls are tested to

the WWB 'Master' bowl. As well as having to comply with the rigorous requirements of the manufacturers. Thus the different models are tested to their model specifications to conform that their performance will be optimal for given greens.
