FOUNDATION DINNER 2007

The annual Foundation Dinner, celebrating the 91st year of the Club was organised by **Barbara Cotton** and well attended by members and guests. Toasting the Club in a witty speech, **Goff Bowles** spoke of the importance of the Club in the local community and the contribution Club culture made to society in general. The Chairman, **Warwick Druce** responded to the toast. The Club archivist, **Lloyd Sommerlad**, related some interesting facts about the early days of the Club. Founded in 1916, the Club had no electricity until 1923 and no telephone until 1924. Members wishing to play had to put their names in a box by 2.15 pm for teams to be chosen and play to commence at 2.30. In those days most members worked on Saturday morning and the late start gave them time to get home from the city.

Until 1950 there was no play on Sundays, reflecting a different attitude to Sunday sport and the large number of staunch churchmen among the Club's membership. A Special meeting of members resolved that the greens should be opened but at first, play was confined to a group called the "Sunday Six" who did not use the green near Arnold St in deference to the wishes of the rector of St. Martins church opposite.

The Club employed its own greenkeeper and they bought him an electric mower in 1926. He complained that he was getting electric shocks. This called for some lateral thinking so they bought him a pair of rubber gloves!

There was no liquor licence before 1947 and only soft drinks were served by the steward. Some members were known to take their glass out to their locker to add a little supplement. The Committee were good sports and decided not to impose a corkage fee. The membership of the Club was over 200 in the 1950s and again in 1971 and that was before the establishment of the Women's Club in 1978. The growing membership had required extensions to the Clubhouse and the purchase of neighbouring properties to provide more green space. Admission to the Club could not be taken for granted. An Investigation Committee was appointed and applicants were interviewed and character references required. The President said in 1972, and we still say it today "to maintain the unsurpassed fellowship and harmony we have always enjoyed, the source of new members should be existing members" During the war years most members of Killara Bowling Club were over-age but three members enlisted and 20 members had sons in the Forces. The Club gave generous help to various War Funds and collected for the "Cigarettes for Soldiers" Appeal. Fines for wrong biases contributed 10,000 cigarettes to the Fund.

Locker Rooms

The Board has given approval in principle to the rearrangement and upgrading of the locker rooms. This is in response to the recent survey of members in which 60% of responses rated the locker rooms as only "Fair" or "Poor".

It is proposed to provide separate locker rooms for men and women on the ground floor. This will save women members having to carry their bowls up and down the stairs.

The first task will be to empty those lockers which have been allocated to members who have left the Club or are no longer playing. Unserviceable and surplus lockers will be identified and discarded. The retained lockers will be given a spray paint and consideration will be given to replacing the carpet.

It is proposed to use the outer section of the locker room as a store for the Club's bowls, the filing cabinets for archives and for the chairs and tables now stacked next to the dais in the Club Room.

The existing women's locker room will be used for meetings of the Board, Committees, Selectors, Coaches etc.

The first task is organising the locker number/naming system and allocating lockers to new members. This has already been started by *Martin McMurray* assisted by *Graham Shirley*.

Thursday Burns and Burns Triples.

The Board has given approval in principle to a proposal for the rejuvenation of the Burns and Burns weekly Thursday afternoon triples games, subject to further details. An idea was initially presented to the Board in 2005 but was not taken up.

The number of visiting players has further dwindled since that time. The KBC Committee recognises that this is a source of revenue from green fees, bar and the canteen and also that it is a potential source of new members. We believe that some of our recent recruits have had their introduction to the Club from having first come to play in the Burns and Burns.

In recent months we have had the pleasure of the company of several members of the Women's Club who have enhanced the afternoons in a number of ways. They are always welcome!

The prizes already donated by our major sponsor Burns and Burns Real Estate will be augmented by the introduction of a Jackpot type competition to be sponsored by Seniors Mortgage Finance. It is now hoped to launch the programme early in 2008

Greens

Members will be well aware that the Hilarie Moore Green has not played well since it was last renovated. It also requires repairs to the protection rubbers on the bank walls. The seats have not been painted for a long time and are in need of painting for preservation and appearances purposes. It will be taken out for its renovation when the Graham Firth Green is back in play.

The Graham Firth Green received its final top dressing on Thursday 29th November and is programmed to be back in play very soon. The recent excellent rain is very welcome.

Members are encouraged to note any complaints or suggestions in an exercise book kept in the Roll-up Room for this purpose. Entries are signed off when they have been attended to. Otherwise please contact either *Bob Hill*, Convener of the Greens Committee or *Ian Cameron-Smith* who assists him.

Bowls Secretary.

The tasks of our Bowls Secretary *Robin Hearder* are many and diverse; listed they occupy two A4 pages. In recognition of this there is the established office of Assistant Bowls Secretary but Robin has hitherto preferred to do it all himself. He has been our Bowls Secretary since 2006 without an assistant but his responsibilities as President of the Rotary Club of Lindfield have become more onerous recently.

Martin McMurray has volunteered to be our Assistant Bowls Secretary who will welcome new members and allocate lockers.

We have divided the other tasks between Robin and other members of the KBC Committee. *Rick Edwards* will look after the Cyril South Competition and other Inter-Club friendly fixtures in addition to being our delegate to Zone 9 of RNSWBA. Bob Hill will look after State Championship matches played at Killara. We still have a few tasks to allocate.

I extend to all members greetings for Christmas and happy bowling in 2008.

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

A group of members met regularly at the Club-house to make camouflage nets and by 1945 the number of nets totalled 3627. There used to be a brass plaque commemorating this contribution in the Clubhouse.

There have not been many ballots for the various positions on Club committees and in particular the office of President has traditionally been filled by consensus without need for a vote. There has only been one occasion on which the position of President has been contested. In 1947 the incumbent President, **A. Williams**, had been in office for 4 years and sought another term. (He was following the precedent of his predecessor, **George Gissing** who had held the office for 9 successive years) A group of members persuaded a Vice-President who had also held his position for four years to accept nomination for the Presidency. In the subsequent ballot, the President was re-elected.. This led to a change in the rules which ever since have limited the holding of the Presidency to 3 years.

The speaker surprised his audience by revealing that the losing Vice-President in that ballot had been his own father, **Hon. E.C.Sommerlad** who had been a prominent member during the war years.

W. Druce, M. Hearder, S. Hashimoto defeating in the final *J. Orton, M. Falconer, V. Newlands* 27/6.


What is happening to our lovely friendly club?? We used to have 40 players for Twilight Bowls, last week we had 15 members.

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NO "WORK" AFTER DELIVERY

One of the fascinating aspects of the game of bowls, especially for the spectators is to watch certain bowlers put extra "work" on their bowls after the said bowls have been delivered. This "work" can consist of arm and/or leg movements, body-tilting or a wide skirting excursion on the hand on which the bowl is delivered, at times trespassing into the adjacent rink.

On the latter occasions well-chosen and suggestive remarks usually emanate from the players "next door" such as, "Righto, Bill, when you're ready", or "Going someplace, Charlie?" down to "Hey, Phar Lap, why don't you keep on your own so-and-so track?" (said in a very friendly manner, of course).

Arm movements generally take the form of the limb fully extended and circling clockwise or anti-clockwise to assist the bowl (which has been delivered perhaps a little too wide) to come back to the jack.

Leg movements include a wide sweep to the right or left, depending on which side the bowl requires assistance. Some bowlers are equally adept with both feet, a legacy from their younger days when they were "star" footballers.

The "walkabout" movement is very general, particularly with the older players. It is used mainly when they feel they haven't given the bowl quite enough "grass" to draw the shot around short bowls, and so they offer encouragement to the bowl by moving in a wide arc from the mat.

At the same time this way out "safari" (the next rink is invariably inhabited by wild species) gives the player a better view of the bowl as it curves towards the jack, perhaps.
