

Major locker room revisions.

Although these changes are extensive no alteration of men's individual locker numbers is envisaged.

A more powerful computer, new software and a new 'multi-function' printer have been installed in the office to complement the new laser printer copier installed earlier. All of the club's needs for printing posters, newsletters, and flyers are now 'in house'.

Congratulations to *Peter Baume* on his recent award of "Companion of the Order Australia" – justly deserved, a great honour very few Australians will ever achieve. Sadly, we have recently lost two long time members of the Club, *Graham Firth* and *John Warner*. With the passing of Graham and John, we have now lost the two remaining Male Life Members. Graham was an institution in our Club, and his memory will live on with our top green bearing his name. John also contributed a great deal to the Club as, among other things, our architectural advisor and remained a champion bowler despite failing eyesight in later years.

I would like to thank these members who have greatly helped the Club with generous donations. When a carnival sponsor recently withdrew at the last minute, one member stepped in and saved the day. Another member has upgraded the clubs computer set up. Again, many thanks!!! With a new photocopier, printer, scanner, fax and computer, our Club is now capable of producing economically and professionally all our publications in house. From preliminary figures for the 2007/8 financial year, we expect a loss of approximately \$9,000, or about \$2000 more that last year. Although our trading profit was greater, exceptional expenses, largely green improvements and locker room costs, were responsible for the increased loss. The good news is that we are going into the new financial year with no major expenses expected. As a show of confidence, we have left subscriptions unchanged.




GRANDMA ISN'T STUPID:

Anzac Day 2008.

The customary Commemoration was held at the Club. However, the year 2008 is the 90th Anniversary of the Battle of Villers-Bretteneux and Elaine Morell provided the following most interesting information, which was announced during the lunch. "Major Roy Morell and Brigadier General Sir William

Glascow organised the plan of battle 90 years ago. The suc-


cessful outcome of this battle proved to be the turning point in World War 1 and was the first major success of the allies.

Major Morell and Brigadier Glascow were invited to Buckingham Palace by King George V and were invested with the OBE (Military



Division) and the DSO. They then went to the battle".

The Club held the commemoration service on the Graham



Firth green near to the Flag staff. The weather threatened to cause us difficulties but the rain was only in the morning and light. Frank Lang gave the oration entirely without notes. It was outstanding. Helen Clark arranged for a Trumpeter from Knox Grammar School to play the 'Last Post' and the 'Rouse'. John Taylor was Flag Orderly.

Locker Room renovation.

Twenty four new low-level lockers have been installed for allocation by KWBC to their members. New numbers, from 181 to 204, been fixed to the doors. The keys in the doors act as door handles and it has been recognised that if lockers were locked and the key mislaid it could lead to problems; so the keys will be fixed into the locks. The existing ground floor lockers remain as 1 to 144 for men and 145 to 180 to women.

KWBC Membership and Roll-up Numbers. The new lockers have presented an opportunity and Board and KWBC Committee have agreed that the present system under which separate sequences of numbers are used by KWBC for Roll-up, for membership and lockers will be replaced by a single sequence of numbers to be used for all purposes. By good luck, the disc board used by KBC for Roll-up discs has ample capacity for both KBC and KWBC members. KWBC will arrange for their names to be put on the appropriately numbered "discs". Members will experi-

ence some dislocation if not confusion in the change-over period but the Board believes that it will be worth while for the simplicity in the long term. To assist members, lists will be put up on the walls of the locker room showing both old and new numbers. Member lockers will continue to be used

A new bench top, both handsome and practical has been

installed and once again we thank Graham Shirley's son-in -law for his generosity for providing the components and Graham for the installation. It is a great improvement. The carpets in the Locker room area have been replaced thanks to *Matthew Bessemer*, Bob Bessemer's son, who is a major contractor in the supply and installation of carpet for large projects. As a consequence, we have had a very high class (but pre-used) carpet installed at no cost what-so -ever to the Club. Thank you Matthew.

will have me as your bride.'


The man looked at the frog for a short time, reached over, picked it up carefully, and placed it in his front shirt pocket.



own motto . . "Service above self". We acknowledge 38 of those remarkable years in service to this club.




Neil Falconer.


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
