






CHAIRMAN'S REPORT: IAN ARMSTRONG

FACTS ABOUT OUR SPORT

Reproduced from Bowls Australia feature "Lifting the Lid" by Neil Dalrymple, Bowls Australia CEO.

There were 514,486 playing bowls in Australia in 2010, who were spread across:


- 158,548 pennant competitions;
- 186,738 participants in other competitions
- 165,594 in social, corporate and school competitions and programs.



The 60-74 years age group is the largest bowls segment, with 42% in 2010. The 75+ age group and 40-59 years age group contributed 24% and 22% of respectively, while the age groups under 40 years contributed just on 12% of participation.

Non-metropolitan, or country, activity outstrips metropolitan participation in bowls. In 2010, 59.5% of bowlers were in country regions (although these country regions accommodate just 38.6% of Australian residents).


The Committee had a Meeting regarding Sunday Bowls and following discussion and suggestions it has been decided to give the following format a trial:-



SELECTOR'S REPORT

Pennants:

The seventh round of the Competition (16th April) was cancelled due to rain. The Zone 9 Match Committee has advised that these matches will only be played at

the conclusion of the sectional draw if the outcome could affect the final result.

The following is a summary of the KBC'S progress to date in each grade:

Grade 6 team remains undefeated in their section and hold a nine point lead over their nearest rival, Belrose. The KBC team is in a strong position at this stage to progress, for the second successive year, to the Post Sectional Draw (round Robin Play). This is scheduled to be played on Saturday 21st and Sunday 22nd May, 2011.

Grade 7 has won one (1) of its six (6) matches and is placed fourth in its section.

Due to unforeseen circumstances the selectors have had to draw on Grade 7 team members to fill in for the Grade 6 team during the first six rounds played. This has impacted on the stability of teams in the lower grade. However the selectors' decisions have, at all times, reflected the Royal N.S.W. Bowling Association 2010-2011 Conditions of Play: Rule - 4.16

Player Grading/Elevation/Regression.

Our thanks to the social players who have made themselves available at short notice to ensure that Grade 7 remained competitive.

41st Year Cyril South Competition:

The fundamental aim in this competition (of three rinks triples) is to provide an opportunity for as many KBC members to play against the ten (10) guest clubs: Asquith, Balgowlah, Belrose, Gordon, Hornsby, Lindfield, St. Ives, Turramurra, Warrawee and West Pymble. This competition is restricted to Grade 3 - 7 representatives from the ten (10) identified clubs.

Twenty eight (28) KBC members registered their interest to compete in this competition and were given the opportunity to play in at least three games.

The four (4) clubs with the highest winning margin against KBC in the 2011 Competition were Belrose, Turramurra, Warrawee and West Pymble.
